AN OFFICIAL EXPLANATION.

Councilman Osburn relates the difficulties and causes of delay in the improvement of Willamette street in a letter published in this issue. Mr Osburn seems to think that the difference in cost between screened gravel and crushed rock compensates for the use of the poorer material.

If roads and streets were built for use but a month in the year, or for a few years only, there would be good reason for such preference. There is so much difference between roads built with gravel, or crushed rock, both as to wear and smoothness and load hauling capabilities, that there should be no question about the economy and selection of materials.

However, Mr Osburn explains that it is impracticable to secure any other material than gravel and sand at the present time, and that must end the matter. Mud to mud must go.

THOSE FARMERS.

Seventeen Names on a Petition Caused Congress to Put a Tar-iff on Porto Rico.

New York Journal, October 22.
Last December William McKinley declared that it was our "plain duty" to give Porto Rico free trade with the rest of the United States. When that declaration was made, Seno E Payne, chairman of the house committee on ways and means, announced himself in favor of free trade, and said that the committee would report a bill to that effect. Indeed, Mr Payne was more emphatic than the president in demanding free trade with Porto Rico, and a bill was prepared providing for free trade. But in the meantime a petition was being prepared asking congress not to permit free trade with Porto Rico, and when the petition was presented Mr McKinley changed his mind, and the ways and means committee of the house changed its effective mind. This petition was, we were informed, a "farmers' petition." That it was effective is evidenced by subsequent events. But who were the "farmers" who signed this petition which had such an influence in Washington? The petition was printed on vellum and bound in morocco—an edition de luxe—and on the cover appears in large gilt letters the label, "A Memorial to Congress from THE FARMERS OF AMERICA." There are seventeen signatures to this "farmers' petition—that many

It must have been a sight worth going miles to see. The spectacle of those trust representatives posing as "farmers" must have had a wonderful effect on the committee. At any rate the committee turned a flip-dop and immediately proposed a tariff for Porto Rico.

"Farmers' petition!" All the genuine farmers in the United States could not secure from the present congress what these seventeen representatives of allied monopoly secured with a single petition—bound in morocco and adorned with gilt lettering.

MOHAWK BRANCH RAILROAD.

The Road Bed Being Ballasted With Dirt—Natron Will Remain Terminal for Winter.

The hauling of gravel on the Southern Pacific Mohawk branch road from the Arlington gravel pit in the McKenzie river bottom, has been suspended on account of the rise in the river partially filling the pit with water. The Japanese work gang employed there has been moved onto the branch road. The work of ballasting will be continued, but dirt will be used instead of gravel. The approaches of all bridges and trestles have been well-graveled, and it is thought by keeping the construction train at work this winter the road can be kept up with dirt ballast.

This train will continue to transfer the lumber cars from Wendling to Springfield. There is considerable speculation as to the feasibility of the dirt ballast. It is a question if the line can be run on a dirt foundation during winter months. Under existing circumstances there is no danger of the terminal of this train being changed from Natron before next spring.

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 18, 1900.
It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov 1, 1900, and advertising commences immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
