SPLENDID CONCERT.

Beatrice Barlow-Dierke's Recital
at Arion Hall an Emi-
nent Success.

At Arion Hall last night a fine audi-
ence greeted the young pianist, Bea-
trice Barlow-Dierke, the excellence of
the work holding the music-lovers
quite in thrall.

The recital proved one of the most
delightful treats ever offered a Port-
land audience, and the program, em-
bracing numbers seldom attempted by
even the leading virtuosos of the day,
was superbly rendered. The debutante's
playing was a wonderful exhibition of
technical mastery. Interpretation
and execution were alike admirable.
After each selection Mrs Dierke was
the recipient of handsome floral tributes
and vociferous applause.

Bohumann's picturesque "Carnaval"
was given with a variety of tone and
artistic phrasing that well merited the
hearty recognition, while the magnifi-
cent interpretation of Liszt's arrange-
ment of the Tannhauser overture, with
its brilliant octave passages, was cer-
tainly a revelation.

The delicate and delightful readings
of Schubert's lovely "Faith in Spring,"
and the dainty nocturne (posthumous)
by Chopin brought out some of the
most exquisite phrases of the perfor-
mer's individuality.

The program closed with the Saint-
Saens duo, the weird "Danse Macabre,"
with Mr Dierke at the second piano.

Judging from the demonstration last
night, Mrs Dierke's triumph was
complete, and today Portland people
are congratulating one another upon
the possession of so earnest and talent-
ed a musician.

Paul Weesinger's pleasing baritone
was greatly enjoyed in the Handel air
from "Alexanderfest," the dramatic
prologue from "Pasielaci," and the
three charming songs by Brahms, Ku-
benstein and Charles Dierke, heard for
the first time in this city.

Mrs Barlow Dierke will be heard in
a recital in Eugene at the Christian
church Saturday, November 10.

NORTHWEST DEAD.

AN INHUMAN MOTHER

Takes Her Young Child to the
Tenderloin District.

Portland Sunday Welcome.

The watchfulness and efficiency of
the officials of the Aid Society was
demonstrated last week when Officer
Hawley arrested and took under his
care Bertha Carmen, a fifteen-year-old
girl.

For the past month Bertha has been
employed by Madame Howe, the
Indian medium, at Third and Alder.
On last Sunday, the girl's mother came
and informed the medium that she
was going to take the child away. The
girl did not want to go, but, as the
mother persisted, the girl finally con-
sented.

Some little time afterwards, it was
learned that the mother and child were
in the Lafayette lodging house, on
Third and Burnside. The Lafayette is
a disreputable house, the abiding place
of prostitutes of all nations and colors.
Knowing that a young girl surrounded
by such influences would soon be led
astray, the Aid Society was notified,
and the child was taken to the Home.

Another child, Maud, only six years
old, was found residing in a private
family on Columbia street. Mrs Car-
men had called at that house and
begged the lady to care for her child.
She stated that she was unable to ob-
tain employment, as no one would
engage her when it was learned that
she was accompanied by a small child.
Out of the goodness of her heart, the
lady cared for the child, and was very
much surprised when Officer Hawley
called, and, after telling the facts of the
case, took the child away.

Mrs Howe says that the elder girl
did not want to accompany her mother
to the Lafayette house. Some time
ago, the mother said that she would
put the girl in a boarding house, as she
could not find employment.

It is not known where Mrs Carmen
is at present, but it is said that she is
at a home for unemployed women.
The father of the children is dead.
Mrs Carmen formerly lived in Eu-
gene.

Frank T. Campbell.

Frank T. Campbell, youngest son of
Mr and Mrs James Campbell, died
Saturday evening at his home on
Camp creek, aged 27 years, from ty-
phoid fever. He had been ill for about
four weeks, and was getting along
nicely, when heart failure suddenly
set in and it was impossible to revive
him. Deceased leaves a wife, father,
mother and brothers and sisters, be-
sides hosts of friends who will learn of
his death with genuine sorrow.

Frank Campbell was one of the
bright and promising sons of Lane
county, and had been successful in all
his undertakings.

The funeral was held at 3 o'clock
this afternoon at the Eugene Masonic
cemetery.

THAT STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Councilman Osburn Relates Why
Gravel Was Chosen for Fill-
ing Up Street Car Track.

EUGENE, OCTOBER 29.

EDITOR GUARD: On several recent
occasions, and especially last Saturday,
you have criticized the council for put-
ting gravel on Willamette street in-
stead of crushed rock. It is very easy
to criticize, but not always so easy to
act. The facts as to Willamette street
are these: The street from Fifth to
Eleventh street is above grade most, if
not all the way, and the only repairs
at all practicable and to keep it near
the grade is simply to round it up in
the center. After the street car line
had been removed and the street made
ready for repairs, Densmore & Fuller,
contractors for furnishing 3000 yards of
crushed rock, failed, but as the time
for completing their contract did not
expire till October 15, nothing could
be done by the city, or anyone else till
then, unless the contract were can-
celled, which was finally done, too
late, however, for another contract to
be entered into this year. As the
winter rains were about to set in the
council deemed it wholly imprac-
ticable for the city or anybody else to run
the rock crusher longer this fall. Now
as for the gravel on Willamette street:

At the last regular meeting of the
council the street committee was in-
structed to put the necessary amount
of screened gravel on the street to fill
up the depression left by the removal
of the car line. The work was begun,
but the gravel furnished was unsatis-
factory, and after considerable had been
hailed the work was stopped. An-
other meeting of the council was held
and additional instructions given the
committee as to the kind of gravel to
be used. For some reason the chair-
man of the committee failed to act till
a few days ago, and the work done is
still far from satisfactory. In that the
stuff hauled is about one-half sand. It
is, to get the kind of gravel ordered,
and only the necessary amount used to
round up the street, in three months' time
it would be hard to tell whether
crushed rock or gravel had been used.

A word more as to the rock crusher.
Where gravel of all kinds is as plenti-
ful as it is in Eugene, and can be put
on the streets for one-half the cost of
crushed rock, and that too at a time
of year when the rock crusher cannot be
run, it seems to me that a rock crusher
is rather an expensive affair for our
city.
