WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Four years ago when Bryan visited New York City, shortly before the national election, it was almost true that there was "none so poor to do him reverence." The political leaders of the Democratic party, Tammany, all, vied with each other in keeping out of his way. And New York state gave McKinley 268,469 over Bryan.

Now on his visit to the metropolis great crowds follow him about, while the political leaders press forward for a touch of the hem of his garment, as it were. Here is a sample from an Associated Press dispatch of October 29:

"Promptly at 9 o'clock Mr. Bryan and party left the hotel for the grand central station, where they took the train for Albany. A squad of 22 policemen, two roundsmen and a sergeant kept the crowd back and a platoon of 20 mounted policemen escorted Mr. Bryan to the station. Notwithstanding the fact that his departure was not announced in any of the morning papers, the people appeared to find out in some way and fully three thousand were gathered about the hotel eagerly awaiting his appearance. As soon as he emerged, with Mrs. Bryan a great shout up."

"On the way up Broadway to the station crowds of people lined the streets on either side and shout after shout rent the air. At the grand central station, Mr. Bryan was at once recognized by the crowds awaiting their trains and it was with great difficulty that the police held the people back and kept a passage way for the party."

Four years ago Bryan came and went almost unheeded. Even a single policeman was not needed to clear his way. What does such a change in the demeanor of the populace portend? Is it not portentous to McKinley?

We shall understand what it all means after next Tuesday. It looks as if New York is sure to cast her vote for Bryan. And the national sentiment that would carry New York could not fail to easily give him the other doubtful northern states necessary to carry him into the White House.

The Guard is not optimistic. But we cannot but believe there is deep significance in transpiring political events. Trusts and imperialism have been heavy loads for President McKinley to carry. Will he be able to stagger into the White House handicapped by such burdens?

THE BETTING ARGUMENT.

"One better has the ratio down just about right. He lives over near Pendleton and has just bet \$1600 to \$100 that McKinley will be elected."—Sunday Morning Register.

The is no proof or argument in a bet. However, it is just as easy to

lose a sixteen to one bet as a one to one. Anyway a guardian should be appointed for that Pendleton man, that is if such a one exists. According to betting reports in the New York Daily World and Journal newspapers, received at this office, gamblers are offering but two and three to one odds on McKinley. At this ratio the Pendleton man should have got \$500 to \$800 put up against his \$1600.

The New York Times says the Vanderbilts have added the Southern Pacific to their already vast railroad system. If true it is good news for the Pacific coast. The Vanderbilts make traffic by giving rates that encourage the development of their railroad territory. The Southern Pacific has not always been seen that their interests lie in a policy that favors the full development of the country in which they operate.

An Illinois court that was called upon to settle the descent of an estate left by a man and wife, who were killed in the same cyclone, have decided that the common rule of law that the woman was the weaker and under equal conditions would die first must obtain where there was no positive proof about the deaths. Under this holding the heirs of the man will get the estate.

A GREAT SPEECH.

Col C E S Wood Addressed a Large Audience at Roseburg.

Review: Col C E S Wood, of Portland, on Saturday night addressed the largest and most enthusiastic meeting held here by either party during the present campaign. The choir furnished excellent music, and Miss Ethel Parrott recited "Who Will Haul Down the Flag" in a manner that brought out a hearty round of applause. Mrs. J B Crawford sang a solo very beautifully.

Judge J W Hamilton, the chairman of the meeting, then introduced Mr. Wood in a few well chosen sentences as a man who placed his country's welfare above party prejudice. Four years ago Mr. Wood supported McKinley on the financial issue, and now believes that other and more important principles of government require the election of Mr. Bryan. His speech was listened to with the closest attention for nearly three hours and there was frequent applause. He exploded some of Congressman Tongue's favorite argument about the foreigner paying the tariff tax, by showing that in every case the American consumer pays it. If not, why not put the tariff so high that the foreigner would pay all the expenses of our government? He explained how the protective tariff system had enabled the great manufacturers to sell their goods at home much higher than abroad, thus growing immensely rich at the expense of the American people. In fact, the great trusts which are fostered by the protective tariff have grown so powerful that they threaten the very existence of free government, and are now seeking by intimidation to control the election of a president. The speaker then took up the question of imperialism and quoted many of Lincoln's speeches and letters, to show that he foresaw the danger from this source that confronted the country. Jefferson was an expansionist only so far as territory on the North American continent was concerned, and he and Washington repeatedly warned their countrymen against foreign acquisitions and foreign entanglement. Col. Wood is a West Point graduate and served as a regular army officer in several Indian campaigns. His father was a naval officer, hence his right to talk to old soldiers on the question of patriotism. He shows that our present army is costing \$200,000,000 annually and our navy millions more, and that the Philippines will, if retained, prove profitable to no one but the big syndicates who would control the sugar, hemp and timber resources, employing many laborers, while the people paid the expenses of the big army and navy required to hold them. The speaker closed with the assertion that every nation paid dearly for its immorality, and showed that the United States was on the wrong side of the Philippine question morally.

There was long continued applause when the great lawyer finished one of the most logical, sincere, fair and candid speeches ever delivered in Roseburg.

"Clarence Bishop was wanted to play with the Salem team, but his friendship for Eugene precluded his doing so. His work as referee gave perfect satisfaction to the spectators, as impartial and fair to all.

"He was stern in his decisions and could not be jolted. The Salem team and their friends all speak in the highest terms of their treatment by the college athletes and the people of Eugene in general. The game home covered with mud and glory but happy as kings and are only waiting for an opportunity to show every courtesy to the visitors in return when they shall have the opportunity.

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900.

It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov 1, 1900, and advertising commences immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
