Oregon Lumber Interests.

Portland Telegram.

On the authority of well-posted
lumbermen it is said an advance in
logs and lumbering may be expected.
The mills adjacent to Portland are
buying log rafts extensively for deliv-
ery months ahead. This is taken to
mean that higher prices will prevail.
Changed conditions prevail in the log-
ging business. The leading millmen
are busy filling orders ahead, neces-
itating the running of large force night
and day. Notwithstanding the de-
mand for lumber and the live condi-
tions of the logging business, it is de-
clared there is little profit.

A condition which militates against
Columbia river loggers is that most of
the logging camps convenient to water
are worked out and good timber can
be had only by penetrating the wooded
wilds further from the river. More
railroad lines will soon be necessary.
It is asserted, to reach the logging for-
ests yet untouched.

DAY FOR THANKSGIVING.

Thursday, November 29, Desig-
nated as the Day.

Washington, Oct. 29.—The state de-
partment today issued the following:
By the president of the United
States of America: A proclamation:
"It has pleased Almighty God to
bring our nation in safety and honor
through another year. The works of
religion and charity have everywhere
been manifest. Our country, through
all its extent, has been blessed with
abundant harvest. Labor and the
great industries of the people have
prospered beyond all precedent. Our
commerce has spread over the world.
Our power and influence in the cause
of freedom and enlightenment have
extended over distant seas and lands.
The lives of our official representatives
and many of our people in China have
been generally exempt from pestilence
and other great calamities, and even
the tragic visitation which over-
whelmed the city of Galveston, and
made evident the sentiments of sym-
pathy and Christian charity by virtue
of which we are one united people.

"Now, therefore, I, William Mc-
Kinley, president of the United States,
do hereby appoint and set apart
Thursday, the 29th day of November
next, to be observed by all the people
of the United States, at home or
abroad, as a day of Thanksgiving and
praise to Him who holds the nations
in the hollow of His hand. I recom-
mend that they gather in their several
places of worship and devoutly give
Him thanks for the prosperity where-
with He has endowed us, for seedtime
and harvest, our armies and navies,
and for all His benefits to us as in-
dividuals and as a nation; and that they
humbly pray for the continuance of
His divine favor, for concord and
amity with other nations, and for
righteousness and peace in all our
ways.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto
set my hand and caused the seal of
the United States to be affixed.

"WM. McKINLEY."
