HOW THE TELLER ROBBED THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF NEW YORK.

Late New York newspapers show how Alvord, the bank teller, managed to steal \$700,000 from the First National Bank of that city, his peculations running over a long period of time. The plan of concealing them, and making the cash on hand agree with the amount for which he was accountable, as shown by the books, was to take out of the morning mail of which he was in charge a sufficient number of cash items to cover the aggregate amount of his defalcation and add them to the exchanges for the clearing house received during the preceding day. This could be easily done as he handled an average of perhaps four million dollars a day.

If Alvord wished to take a vacation he would make charges enough against some big out-of-town correspondents to balance the amount of his shortage, then return to balance accounts before settlements the first of the succeeding month brought exposure.

The man lived over a little hell, but he took his enjoyments and pleasures without showing the least sign of being the possessor of a conscience.

A GOOD ONE.

Those patent political supplements which are folded in every issue of the local Republican papers now-a-days are queer things when one has the time to waste in studying them. For instance, the latest out in Oregon has a heading, "Men who have deserted Bryan for McKinley," and the most prominent name mentioned in this department is that of Gen. Lew Wallis, the novelist. As Mr. Wallace never supported Mr. Bryan or any other Democratic candidate for president in his life, this news of his "flip" makes interesting reading.

One of these supplements intended for eastern country circulation was by mistake sent out into Kansas, and scattered broadcast before the mistake was noticed. It gave a list of five hundred voters in Lawrence county, who had flipped from Bryan to McKinley, and as there is no Lawrence county in the state of Kansas, it produced somewhat of a sensation out there. Now the Republican managers are trying to call them all in in order to send them back east where Kansas geography is not well known.

THE BETTING ARGUMENT.

The betting odds on McKinley have parallels in the case of Cleveland, in 1888, when the odds ranged 5 to 3 to 2 to 1, yet he was defeated by 65 majority in the electoral college. In the succeeding presidential election the odds were 2 1/2 to 1 on Harrison, yet Cleveland had 62 plurality in the electoral college. The betting odds are always in favor of the party in power.

There is another view of the situation. Practically all the millionaires are against Bryan. They can afford to bet and lose. The odds are what they are because the men with money to wager are backing their wish and their hope.

Occasionally political enthusiasts overshoot the mark. For instance a Mr. Feldenheimer, just returned from New York, assures the Portland Telegram that "McKinley will sweep the country," and adds that "even Croker's men are betting on McKinley when they get a chance." Now if Mr. Feldenheimer will explain how there can be any betting going on when both sides are anxious to bet on McKinley he will relieve many minds that have been figuring on the proposition.

"All preparations are made here to enormously swell the vote for McKinley" wires the Eugene correspondent of the Salem Journal to that paper. The "preparations" may have been made, yet there will not be much swelling witnessed without election officials do clever work. And the GUARD has no question of the honesty of the men who will receive and count the votes next Tuesday.

FOOTBALL IN PORTLAND.

University of Oregon Boys Play Multnomah Athletic Club Saturday

The local football season will be opened next Saturday by one of the best games of the season, when the crack eleven of the University of Oregon will contest for honors with the Multnomah Athletic Club team. In spite of the fact that Eugene was defeated Saturday by the Salem Athletic Club team, Multnomah men who saw the game are of the opinion that the game will be full of interesting and sensational features. The Eugene team played magnificent football, and the game was closer than the 5-0 score indicates. Under Coach Kaarberg, the star California fullback, the Oregon team is putting up splendid interference, and the dash and quickness of their game will both the clubmen considerably.

"Under Captain Pratt and Coach McMillan the Multnomah team is practicing nightly on one of the tennis courts, by electric light, against the strong second eleven, under Captain Ted Wood. This week will be spent in perfecting team play and interference for the hard opening game Saturday. The Multnomah team will outweigh their opponent four pounds to the man, and this excess of weight and the greater individual experience of the club players will counterbalance the superior training of the college team." "F. S. Fisher, of The Dalles, a former Stanford football captain, has been asked to referee the game."

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900.
It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov. 1, 1900, and advertising commences immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
