WILLAMETTE STREET REPAIRS.

Councilman White Has His Say
About the Matter.

EUGENE, Nov. 5, 1900.

EDITOR DAILY GUARD: In your issue of the 1st inst appears an article signed by F. W. Osburn. Mr. Osburn states that he does not care to prolong the discussion. Of course not. He knows the truth and knows that when all the facts are given it will do him no good.

Now as to Mr. Osburn's proposition to furnish crushed rock for \$1.00 per yard: The proposition was not handed over to me, but was given to the city attorney and handed by him to the different members of the council just before the meeting of the council was called to order, and the proposition was read by myself and Messrs. Osburn, Preston and Roney. When the council was called to order by the mayor Mr. Osburn took the floor, made a statement that Messrs. Densmore & Fuller had been released from their contract to furnish crushed rock.

Mr. Osburn claimed that it was getting too late to operate the crusher, and moved that the street committee be instructed to improve Willamette and Eleventh streets with screened gravel. The motion carried. Mr. Osburn also moved that the chairman of the council be instructed to bring the crusher into the city and house it up for the winter. This motion carried also, and I, as chairman of the street committee, was in this way instructed to bring the crusher in, and I did. Mr. Osburn contended in support of the last motion that the crusher was out of repair, which was a fact, but Councilman Peter Hulsted that the crusher could be repaired in thirty-six hours.

I believed at the time, and became more fully convinced after discussing the matter with the business men of the city, that the placing of gravel on Willamette street instead of crushed rock was a serious mistake, and that the proper thing from every point of view was to repair Willamette street with crushed rock. I was honest in the belief and desired to act in the matter to the best interests of the taxpayers and the property owners; but it seems that I have incurred the displeasure, especially of Mr. Osburn, and it may be a majority of the council who it seems now agree and for some time past have agreed with Mr. Osburn in this matter.

Mr. Osburn is inclined to censure me, and speaks somewhat severely of me. Concerning the kind of gravel that has been used on Willamette street, he speaks of it as "boulders" and "sand." Mr. Osburn and other members of the council know full well that it is very difficult to obtain the proper kind of gravel for use on the streets, and that to screen and obtain the best grade of gravel is almost impossible unless a large expense be incurred in doing so. I am satisfied that to obtain and prepare the proper grade of gravel for Willamette street will cost not less than \$1.00 per yard, and I think more. I did the best I could, and instructed the teamsters hauling gravel that the city desired and must have gravel, not rock. I acted in the matter conscientiously, and the best I knew how; besides other members of the council knew of and saw this gravel as it was being hauled and placed on the street, and were counseled and consulted by me in regard to the gravel. I feel that Mr. Osburn's strictures toward me in this matter are unwarranted and uncalled for, and am of the opinion that his censure and complaint against me is not altogether based on this matter of the street improvement.

It is true, as Mr. Osburn said, that it had been raining, and the weather had been unfavorable for this work, but I do not think that it would have rained any harder, or more continuously if we had been operating the crusher and hauling crushed rock than if we had been hauling and screening gravel. During this time we have hauled and placed on Willamette and Eleventh streets about 700 loads of screened gravel, and I think we could have run and operated the rock crusher, so far as the weather is concerned, to as good advantage as to screen and haul gravel. I have had no personal interest in the matter farther than to serve the people who elected me to the office I hold, as well as the entire city, to the very best of my ability.

As to the personal thrust Mr. Osburn throws at me: "Who prepared your statement, who has you now in charge?" I will say that I belong to no ring or clique. I do not belong to your, or any other ring, or combination. I consider myself a free man and will certainly not accordingly. I desire to discharge my duty as a councilman to the best of my ability, and to the best interest of the city without prejudice for or against any one. I assure you that I have no friends to reward, or enemies to punish. You may have a majority of the council behind you, and you may be able to control a majority of the present council, and no doubt can and will, but I assure you, and the citizens of Eugene, that I shall continue to act conscientiously on all questions coming before the council on my own best judgment, and from the best information I can get, without malice or ill feeling toward you or any one else. But the fact that you and a majority of the present council may at any time hold a different opinion from mine will not arouse anger or fear in the performance of my official duty. I prepared my own statement, and if I had not I own your question discloses a desire on your part to stir up contention in the council, and is an insinuation which you cannot well afford to make.

I will say that as a member of the council I have never secretly or otherwise pledged myself to any other member, or members of the council, to oppose or support any measure, or person to any appointive office, nor have I disregarded any petition from the citizens or business men of Eugene.

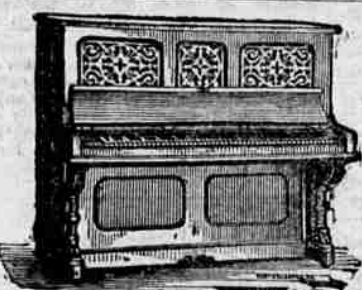
