RUSSIAN ADVANCEMENT.

Perhaps no country in the world today is making more gigantic effort for self-improvement or for commercial prosperity and supremacy than is Russia. In her daring plan of colonizing Siberia she has asked no outside help. No emigration agents have visited foreign shores with alluring promises to all sorts of people to settle within her borders.

Russia is colonizing Siberia with Russians, and seeing to it that the pioneers of Siberia are well stocked with farming utensils, seeds, and with fruit and nut-bearing trees suitable to the rigorous climate. Skilled men are sent out by the government from time to time to watch the effect of climate upon the new forests, fruits, cereals and vegetables, and to advise the pioneers of any errors in their style of planting.

GOOD ELECTION ADVICE.

This admonition of Cardinal Gibbons, given the day before election, loses nothing of its force and effect when read the day after the election:

"Vote then on Tuesday for the candidate of your choice. And as you are guided by your conscientious judgment in the selection of your candidate, you should give to your neighbor who differs from you due credit for being actuated by the like honorable motives. Do not imagine that the country will go to perdition if your favorite is defeated. And let not your opponent indulge in the pessimistic notion that we shall witness a revolution and a social upheaval if his candidate is not elected. TIN-PLATE TRUST.

California Fruit World.
The tin-plate trust is said to be directly responsible for the great advance in the price of tin, and for closing down factories to restrict production. Thousands of men have consequently been thrown out of employment, and the usual pack of canned goods has been seriously interfered with. All canned goods will therefore be higher than last year. The tin-plate trust is getting itself with a most bounteous feast, but the community at large is paying the bill.

CARNEGIE'S EXPERIMENT.

Andrew Carnegie's experimental fleet of five vessels sailed from Genoa, Ohio, yesterday, bound for Europe, each loaded with 1000 tons of steel sent from Pittsburgh. The vessels are loaded to 14 feet draught. Each craft will tow a barge 1000 tons.

ONE CASE DECIDED.

Effort to Set Aside a Deed in Lane County.

Salem Statesman Nov. 6.
In the supreme court, one decision was handed down yesterday, as follows:

Fredericka Rosteln, respondent, vs. Jacob R. Park, appellant, an appeal from Lane county, Hon. J. O. Fullerton, Judge, reversed. An opinion by Associate Justice F. A. Moore.

This was a suit to set aside a deed to real estate. The evidence shows that the defendant, prior to February 5, 1897, owned a farm in Lane county and on that date plaintiff and her husband traded him, for the farm, a tract of land in El Dorado county, California, the parties exchanging deeds. That later defendant found that the plaintiff had no legal title to the California property and defendant immediately demanded the return of the Lane county farm. Later plaintiff and her husband met defendant in an attorney's office in Eugene where, being asked to re-transfer the Lane county farm to the defendant, the plaintiff refused, when she was informed by the attorneys present that, if she did not sign the deed, she would be arrested as a swindler. She finally signed the deed. Thereafter she brought this action to set aside the deed, alleging duress by threats of imprisonment. The court, after making an exhaustive examination of the testimony in the case, which does not corroborate the complaint in any respect, holds that the deed in question was not executed in consequence of any duress, and that it is sufficient to convey the legal title of the premises described to the defendant, and the decree of the lower court is therefore reversed and the complaint dismissed.

A Jackson County Fatality.

Ashland Record, Nov. 6.
The S. P. Co's railroad track at Gold Hill was the scene of a terrible fatality Saturday night at 9:25 o'clock, through which Spencer Childers, of Medford, lost his life. Childers, who was employed in Jennings' livery stable, and a companion named Ira Anderson, arranged to go to a dance which was to take place in Gold Hill. They had raised the passenger train and could not procure a buggy in town so they determined to ride on one of the many extra freight trains now running on the road.

The two young men succeeded in mounting a through freight at Medford without any of the crew noticing them. But unfortunately for them this train did not stop at the station at Gold Hill and they jumped off while it was going at the rate of 20 miles an hour. Anderson seems to have succeeded in getting off with a few bruises, but Childers fell under the wheels of the moving train and his body was terribly mangled and cut up.
