Survey of the S. P. Connecticut With Main Line.

THE MANAGEMENT PROGRESSIVE.

Work has been commenced on the short strip of railroad which is to connect the Wendling branch of the Southern Pacific with the main line. Engineer C. S. Freeland and a force of men are making a final survey of the proposed road between the Springfield station and the point where a bridge will span the Willamette and from there to Henderson station on the main line. They are setting the grade stakes, and are following the route of the preliminary survey with scarcely any alteration.

It is not yet given out when the work of grading will begin or the erection of the bridge, but it will probably be in the early spring.

Other plans in connection with these improvements are being considered and will be made known from time to time.

Florence Shipping News.

The West, November 9.

The schooner Danielson, which had been bar bound here for over a week, left for San Francisco Sunday with a cargo of lumber.

The schooner Ralph J. Long, of San Francisco, was towed in over the bar Sunday morning and went to Acme to load with lumber.

The schooner Bells, Captain Smith, was towed in Monday morning. She will take on a quantity of canned salmon from the canneries and finish her cargo with lumber from the Florence Lumber Co's mill.

The postoffice at Vida, Lane county, Or., has been moved two miles to the west, with no change of postmaster.

Governor Geer has appointed R. Alexander of Pendleton, a member of the commission to represent Oregon at the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo.

The Florence West says there was a large crowd in that town election day. 212 votes were cast in all, that being the largest number ever polled in that precinct.

Ex-Governor Penneyer is nothing if not unique. He explains the situation in the following sensational way: "Bryan has defeated himself again. He depended upon his oratory and lost by shifting attention from McKinley's blunders to his own obstinacy. Had his acceptance speech been his last he might have won. Between Cleveland's treason and Bryan's egotism the democratic party has been nearly crucified."

The Portland Telegram of November 12th, tells about a curious occurrence: "Convulsions seized Samuel C. Mowery, a logging man of Stella, Wash., while he was working in the woods, and were so violent as to cause him to dislocate his neck. The primary cause was cerebral meningitis. He was brought to Portland and the dislocation reduced, but he died from the effects."
