"The people chose the empire with its colonies and large standing army; the heavy debts to maintain the army and the colonies; the perpetual war incident to military government with colonies; the gold standard and the paper money to be expanded and contracted at will by the Rockefeller, Morgans and others who own from one hundred to five hundred millions of dollars each; the trusts and syndicates with their profits of \$40,000,000 to \$80,000,000 a year, and the alleged 'full dinner pail' for the working man."

THE SPADE FOR WAR.

British soldiers were found deficient in the use of the spade during more than one engagement in the South African war where hastily constructed protection for men on the firing line was required. Hereafter British recruits will be taught how to dig, as well as shoot. But if the use of the spade is followed by turning the spears and rifles into pruning hooks and peaceful articles of manufacture all will be well for war-burdened humanity.

HE PAID THE PREACHER.

The country swain and his sweetheart had come from the mountain fastness to be married at the minister's house in an Eastern Oregon town. The ceremony was over, but the bridegroom hesitated. There was another important function to be performed. "What do I pay for this," he asked. "The law allows two dollars and a half," said the minister, willing to swell his wife's pin-money fund to that extent, but not wishing to ask more than would be convenient for the bridegroom to pay.

The United States government has started a "bargain counter" at the Charlestown, Massachusetts, navy yard, and are disposing of the old cannon that were discarded from the Boston harbor defenses. The guns which originally cost about \$6000 each, have been marked down to seemingly ruinous figures. Sixty-two guns and fifty-one gun carriages were recently sold for a lump sum of \$6000. A second lot of ninety-one guns and sixty-six gun carriages were sold for \$5000.

The Linton horse-meat cannery below Portland proved a financial failure on account of a lack of market, the poorer classes of the large cities for whom it was intended not taking to the meat, even though it was sold at a low figure. However the owners will make another run on a thousand or more "outlets" Indian ponies that they got at about their own price over on the Eastern Oregon plains. It is said the peculiar sweetness of horse-flesh is the reason that it fails of popular favor.

There has been no landslides in favor of trusts and imperialism. Things look brighter as the smoke of battle clears away. A change of a very small percentage of votes in the big states would have elected Bryan. The war and blood-letting spirit that found vent in the nomination of Roosevelt, a soldier of the Spanish-American war, was of too recent origin to be overcome by sober reason.

A Cannibal Bear.

The Florence West is responsible for this extraordinary bear story: R. H. Bernhardt is quite a trapper though Mr. Colvin is a little ahead of him on bear this fall. However Mr. Bernhardt has six bear to his credit for the fall's work. The fifth caught was a small one and when Mr. Bernhardt visited the trap he found that something had killed the animal and eaten a portion of the carcass. He had heard that one bear will sometimes eat another which is caught in a trap but did not believe the statement. A day or two later he caught a large bear and on examining the stomach found in it bones and bear's hair which satisfied him that the creature had been practicing cannibalism.
