LECTURE BEFORE THE UNIVERSITY.

Method and Ethics of Editorial Writing by Mr Ernest Bross.

The lecture before the University at assembly this morning by Mr Ernest Bross, managing editor of the Oregonian, was well received by the student body and townspeople. The subject, "Methods and Ethics of Editorial Writing," was ably presented by a practical man, for theory has no place against practice in modern newspaper work.

Preliminary to the address Dr Bross spoke of the excellent results noted in the influence of the University upon the state at large. He controverted the statement often made that the University is a local institution by the assertion that but 23 per cent of the student body is from Lane county, a smaller per cent than the attendance at Yale from a radius of 50 miles around. This showing proves the wide influence of the school.

Mr Bross stated that while the newspaper is primarily a business factor it must have ideals, and the purpose of the paper is to impress its ideals upon the readers. But the ethical ideal of a newspaper is sometimes sacrificed and its influence frequently lost in the effort to attain power in other lines, sometimes political at other times personal. With regard to the editorial department of a paper, that which shows the influential character, it lies with the personality of the editor himself. If his aims are lofty, his reverence for his Creator pronounced and intellectual attainments prominent, the influence of that paper cannot be computed. The literary form, historical and general accuracy must always be carefully considered, while to get the news is the first consideration. The circulation is at once a value to the business department and essential to the influence of the paper, while it is demanded that the mechanical work is such as to make the paper attractive.
