E. R. SKIPWORTH

Addresses the Oregon Bar Association at Portland.

E R Skipworth, of Eugene, spoke on "The Two Views—Service of the Bar to the State and the Usurpation of Power," at the Oregon Bar Association meeting in Portland yesterday as follows:

"The theme I have chosen for the observations I shall submit to you is, 'The Two Views.' Embodied in this subject shall be a presentation, in outline only, of the eminent and patriotic services the profession of law has rendered to the world, and to our country in particular; and also a retrospect, in brief, of the powers exercised in the administration of the government by the bar.

"To the profession of law belong the great judges, the great advocates, the great writers on jurisprudence, the great lawgivers of all nations and ages. When we know of one of its members performing a great service to human liberty, to order or to jurisprudence, we feel a personal pride and feel to share in the honor of the achievement, in the very throes of war with the mother country, we secured through Adams, justice for British soldiers, who had obeyed the orders from their superiors.

"It was the master mind of John Marshall that gave practical effect to the constitution, declaring that the government of the United States of necessity, exercises its power directly upon the people, throughout the whole extent of our great country, and not immediately through the states, nor with the aid nor even with the consent of state governments.

"The doctrine of Jefferson upheld individual liberty, developed individual strength and enlarged individual manhood. The doctrine of Marshall has given us a strong and mighty nation, and has given to every man the hope that he shall in peace enjoy the rewards of his own honest toil. These were not the enunciations of mere doctrinaires, but of great lawyers and practical statesmen.

"The profession of law in this broad and enlarged meaning is really a department of government and not a mere trade or calling. Every political question is so intimately connected, at least with some form or branch of law, that necessarily the lawyers are largely if not wholly responsible for their settlement. The legal profession has never yet inspired or encouraged mob spirit, and I feel I am warranted in the belief that our profession will always remain the rock of defense against turbulence and violence, and will stand up like a giant for liberty and order."

FREDERICK H KINSEY

Serving as a Juror When Fatally Attacked With Heart Trouble.

NO ASSISTANCE COULD BE GIVEN.

Portland Telegram, Nov. 20.

Frederick H Kinsey, one of the regular trial jurors for the November term, and one of the jurors drawn this morning in the Kuetemeyer murder case, died suddenly within five minutes of taking his seat in the jury box. Mr Kinsey seemed to be taken with a fit of some kind at first, and was carried hurriedly to the clerk's office, off Judge George's courtroom, where an attempt was made to relieve him. It was unsuccessful, as death followed the attack.

It all happened so quickly that many people in the courtroom hardly realized what had occurred until it was all over. The names of 13 jurymen had been called, among them that of Mr Kinsey. They had stepped into the box and Ed Mendenhall had addressed his opening question to Mr Kinsey. The bailiff was seen to motion for help and it was seen that Mr Kinsey was breathing with difficulty, and that he was evidently attacked with some trouble. The other jurors assisted in carrying him to a side room, where some attempts to revive him, while physicians were telephoned to come to the courthouse at once. Before they had time to arrive, however, it was seen that Mr Kinsey was past recovery. Heart trouble of some nature had attacked him and death was almost instantaneous. His family was communicated with and also Coroner Rood.

Several physicians appeared in the courthouse within a short time after they were sent for, but it was too late to do any good, and it is doubtful if they could have saved his life if they had been on hand at once. As soon as possible the remains were removed to the morgue, another name was drawn from the jury list, and the trial of Al Kuetemeyer was proceeded with.

It is not known that Mr Kinsey had been subjected to such attacks and that which caused his death, and for that reason it seems all the more sad. He was in conversation with a number of acquaintances this morning before court convened, and he was apparently in the best of health. After stepping to his seat with the jury, he went for his overcoat, and it was on his way that he clutched the bailiff by whom he was seated, as if seeking help. Court was adjourned for the time, until it was seen that nothing could be done and the remains were removed to the morgue.

Frederick H Kinsey is well known in Portland, having resided here for some 25 years. He has been employed as a car repairer and builder in the O R & N shops, and was so employed up to the time of his death, although he had laid off in order to serve as a juror during the present term. He has been the head man in the car shops and has always been held in high esteem. His home has been at 664 East Ankeny street for the past five years, where he has resided with his wife and one daughter, Miss Grace Kinsey, who is a teacher at the Stephens' Addition school. Before that he lived at Ninth and Burnside streets.

When it was known that he was dead, Judge George telephoned to Mrs Kinsey asking if her husband had left for the court house, and then telling her that he had met with an accident, and that she had better come to the court house at once. She evidently divined that it was something serious, as she cried out in terror and left the telephone. Miss Grace Kinsey, who was in her school room, was called to a telephone by a friend of the family and told the sad news, and was asked to accompany her mother. Mrs Kinsey reached the court house first and when told of her husband's sudden death, her grief could not be controlled, and finally she had to be led away.
