A WOMAN'S WORTH IN CHINA.

A woman's worth in China is as the mother of sons, says Leslie's Popular Monthly. Beyond that she lives for the service of man, sometimes even for the dead. I heard of a girl who had become engaged and was married to a dead man, whose parents did not think it right that he should be a bachelor in the spirit world. In South China there are in some places baby markets, where infant girls can be bought for 50 cents or less.

Dr. Martin, president of the Dowager Empress' new university, says that not one Chinese woman out of 10,000 can read a book understandingly. I asked a group of Chinese once why the women were not taught. One replied: "We consider women inferior and unworthy." A second said: "The women are considered of not very great use." A third answered: "The Chinese have many immoral novels, and keep women ignorant so that they cannot read these." A fourth said: "Woman's work is in the house; she has no business with anything outside."

Italy prohibits the sale of art treasures for export except by consent of the government. A dealer has just been fined 14,000 lire (\$2800) for having sold a bust of Buonvanto Cellini to a London dealer. Such a fine is enough to make the dealer go and get on a bust himself.

Another ship is on the fatal sands a short distance north of the mouth of the Columbia river. And she is very likely to stay there, although the captain offers ten thousand good dollars to the tugs that may get her into deep water. The name of the ship, Pottalook, probably had nothing to do with getting her into such trouble.

Salem has a very liberal man. He has this advertisement in the Statesman: "If the party who stole my chickens Tuesday night will call and settle inside of two weeks, nothing will be said, and a present of two hens will be given him. The parties are known." But why should he offer to make a present of "two hens" when he knows who the parties are?

A Portland man just back from Cape Nome says the scarcest commodity is coal, because so much of it was destroyed by the late flood. Coal now retails at \$100 a ton. There is no chance of getting any more coal in there this winter. Any vessel attempting it would have to take chances of running the ice blockade and being crushed into splinters.

Those "if" persons who are of the opinion that the University of Oregon might have scored in the second half with the clubmen at Portland yesterday "if" Dick Smith had not been put out of the game should supplement their "if" with what might have happened if McMillan, the star player of Multnomah club had been able to play the game.

Our sister state of Washington has passed Oregon in the race for population. She increased 48 per cent in the last decade while we increased nearly 33 per cent. Washington has 518,103 against Oregon's 418,506. Washington's increase mainly comes through her position on Puget Sound as an outfit for the northern gold fields, and the vast plains of Eastern Washington that are being converted into wheat fields.

Portland Telegram, Wednesday: "Tomorrow it will be found that University of Oregon eleven is such a crack team as their recent reputation has swelled them up to be."

The answer came in the affirmative. The University boys kept the big and heavier Multnomahs from scoring, and while they did not score themselves outplayed their opponents, and had the better of the game at almost every stage thereof. Multnomah was kept on the defensive on the last half, and nothing but good fortune enabled the clubmen to prevent the Oregon boys from scoring.
