BUTTE CITY SULPHUR FUMES.

The great smelters in the vicinity of Butte City, Montana, are responsible for peculiar conditions. Fred Herbold, just returned to Eugene from that place, says the sulphur fumes released in the smelting of the ores have deadly effect on vegetation. In consequence the homes of Butte and in that vicinity are flowerless, shrubless and treeless. The residences are built close to the street line, often against it. If not against the street the usual yard space is covered with fine rock. Many residences front the ten-foot alleys that run at right angles across the blocks.

The powerful effect of the sulphur may be realized from the statement that fir and pine trees on the mountain side seven miles across the valley from the smelters have been killed by the fumes. Yet the human plant survives the noxious gases.

A CALIFORNIA AMAZON.

Miss Julia Austin, the Lake county giantess and foot-racer, has just arrived from the snow-capped peaks of Alaska, where she has been in training for more than twelve months. Miss Julia was matched against the great Alaska Indian foot-racer in a dash of 200 yards for \$40,000. She ran the distance in twenty seconds, racing her victim from start to finish and winning the glittering gold by a small majority. This beautiful young lady stands 7 feet 3 inches in her stocking feet, weighing 160 pounds; was born in Colorado and raised in Lake county. She speaks seven different languages, and can outrun any human on earth for money.

The famous beauty above referred to is of Lake county, California, noted for health resorts, and stalwart women.

Holland receives her countryman Oom Paul Kruger with unbounded enthusiasm. Holland is one of the cradles of human liberty. Her great stadholder, William of Orange, has a niche in the temple of human fame on a level with our Washington. Single-handed the little Dutch state fought Spanish barbarity, as represented by the bloody Duke of Alva, for twenty years. Spain's assassin at last stilled the heart of William "the Silent," but to no avail. The fire of Holland's patriotism did not depend on the life of her matchless leader. Spain could not conquer Holland.

The scramble for office is exemplified in Douglas county where a half-score of men are candidates for the county judgeship, left vacant by resignation. The salary is but \$1000 a year. Few of the applicants would hire out for the \$33.33 a month that appertain to the office, yet are anxious to put themselves in a position where the whole people can abuse them, for that amount.

The Treadwell mine on Bear Island, Alaska, is a wonderful producer. There is a mountain of low grade free milling ore, averaging for the past year's work only \$1.56 a ton. But the cost of milling is only 38 cents a ton, leaving a net working profit of \$1.20. The profit from the year's work was \$674,000. Ore in sight is estimated at four million tons.

The Marshfield match factory is running full time and giving employment to 18 persons. As the laborers are becoming skilled in their work the output is being gradually increased. A shipment of 1000 cases to San Francisco was made last week.

For the past two years hard times have prevailed in the shoe towns of Massachusetts. The shortage in the shipment of boots and shoes from Boston as compared with last year amounts to 384,872 cases.

GOV. HILL OF MAINE.

INTERESTING CAREER OF THE NEW PINE TREE EXECUTIVE.

Physician and Publisher and Son of Affairs—Maine's Old Manston to Be the statehouse—Mrs. Hill a Queen of Officialdom.

Of all the liberal professions medicine is the one whose members seem least inclined to mingle in politics. The exacting nature of their duties naturally prevents them from taking an active share in the affairs of government. This explains in part why so few medical men have sought or obtained elective office. Dr. John F. Hill, the governor elect of the Pine Tree State, is a conspicuous exception to this rule, but then Dr. Hill has devoted very little time to practice since graduating from Bowdoin Medical college. He has other business interests, many of them of great importance, and is very wealthy.

Dr. (or Governor) Hill comes of an ancestry closely connected with Maine's history, and his grandfathers were a direct descendant of Sir John Mason, the original proprietor of the province of New Hampshire. Dr. Hill himself has served his state well in the legislature and as a member of the governor's council. In 1896 he was a Republican presidential elector. He could have had the Republican nomination for governor, but declined it because of ill health.

Dr. Hill's business interests render him one of the busiest men in all New England. He is largely interested in

The electrical railroads of his state and holds considerable real estate. He is director and trustee of several financial institutions, and the two leading hotels of Augusta are owned by him. But the greatest of Dr. Hill's interests is his partnership in one of the largest publishing houses in the country. His firm, Vickery & Hill, publishes magazines of national reputation, reaching more than a million readers in the United States.

Governor Hill has been married twice. His second and present wife is a woman of wonderful ability and charm and is very well known and liked by the people of Maine. She hails from Missouri and is the daughter of Norman J. Colman, ex-secretary of agriculture under President Cleveland. She was a widow when she met Dr. Hill at Bar Harbor while summering there three years ago. Naturally, Mrs. Hill's life has been spent in officialdom, and she will preside over the Maine gubernatorial mansion with grace and skill. Governor Hill has two sons by his first wife, both at school.

The mansion that will be the Maine White House during the administration of Dr. Hill is in itself an object of national and historic interest. It is the old residence and almost lifelong home of the "Plumed Knight" and was leased by the governor elect two years ago as a residence.

A YOUTHFUL STAR.

James Young and His Successful Theatrical Career.

James Young enjoys the reputation of having been the youngest legitimate star this country has ever known. He started out at the head of his own company in a repertory of Shakespearean and classical plays when he was but 18 years of age, and what is more, he won praise from many of the most careful critics of the country. Later he was a member of Augustin Daly's company. Upon the death of that manager he again became a star, using but one play, "Lord Byron."
