THE OCEAN SUBSIDY GIFT.

President J. J. Hill of the Great Northern Railway is a level headed and successful business man, and has business ideas. Referring to the ship subsidy bill, intended to open the treasury for the benefit of a few favorites, President Hill is quoted as saying:

"No doubt some of my friends thought they were serving me and, in a money sense, perhaps they were, but I would rather see them take the duty off the plates that are to go into the ships when they are built. If Congress will appropriate \$180,000,000 for a class of ships that will reduce the cost of carrying our commerce, we will have a right to feel that they have done well, but we don't think that they should give the bulk of it to 20 or 21 ships that are only compelled to run 21 knots once to the satisfaction of a government officer detailed for that purpose."

President Hill's railroad has a line of steamers running across the Pacific, and will share the government benefaction. He knows that the subsidy is not needed and is a simple gift to rich corporations that would run the boats, subsidy or no subsidy.

Roseburg Review: "There is much speculation around the court-house regarding the appointment of Judge Lyons' successor, and all the officials there are outspoken in their regret over the judges' action. They feel that the county has lost the services of one of the ablest men that was ever at the head of its affairs. Some say that the democrats should be given the place by the governor, but no democrat has yet come forward and put in his claim to the place. Among the republicans mentioned are: D. S. K. Buick, John H. Shupe, John W. Wright, of this city; Commissioner M. D. Thompson, of Scottsburg; W. A. Perkins and E. Roy Applegate, of Drain; ex-Judge A. F. Stearns, of Oakland, and probably a score or more besides. It is not known that any of those mentioned are active candidates, but it is supposed that there will be a lively tussle over the appointment before it is made. The office pays \$1,000 a year."
