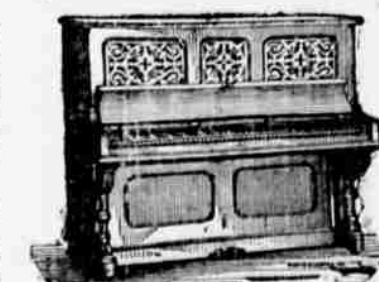

COMMITTED SUICIDE

Young Wm. Jones Shoots Him-
self at Cottage Grove.

AT SEVEN O'CLOCK THIS MORNING.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or, Dec 13.—This morning the usual serenity of this place was disturbed by the announcement that young William Jones, son of Newt Jones, had committed suicide by shooting himself.

Young Jones, who was 20 or 21 years of age, had been drunk all last night and going into his father's saloon at 7 o'clock this morning told his father good-bye, went up to his room above the saloon and in a minute or so a pistol shot was heard. Mr Jones, the father, and several others rushed upstairs and were horrified to find the young man lying in bed with a bullet-hole in his head and the blood running over the bed and floor. Death occurred instantly.

No motive for this rash deed is apparent unless the young man had been partially crazed by the excessive use of liquor the night before.

Coroner G W Griffin, of Eugene, telephoned this morning deputizing Justice Vaughan to hold an inquest over the body, which was done this afternoon. The jury empaneled rendered a verdict to the effect that the young man came to his death from a pistol shot wound inflicted by his own hand.

LATER.

It is said that the cause of the suicide was disappointment in a love affair. A gentleman from Cottage Grove today stated that yesterday evening young Jones received a letter from some young lady and immediately began drinking, ending an all-night spree with suicide.

The generous business men and women of Eugene, have donated a nice list of merchandise specials which have been well distributed throughout the several classes and will be counted as cash where placed and the deficiency, if any, will be made up in cash. In addition to this a number of the larger specials have been placed for the highest scoring pens in a number of classes.

The entry fees are 10 cents for single specimens and 25 cents additional for pen entry, provided all fowls shall first be entered singly.

The undersigned is the superintendent of the show and believes that his organization justifies him in thinking he can render satisfaction to all exhibitors and will at least make an earnest effort to do so.

Entries close Wednesday evening, Dec 26, at 10 o'clock, and all exhibits must be in the show room by 8 o'clock a m, Thursday.
