The Memorial Fountain.

The public drinking fountain to be erected in the city park in memory of the deceased members of Company C, Second Oregon Volunteers, who laid down their lives in protecting our glorious old flag in the Philippines, will arrive in Eugene from Vermont about January 1, 1911, so the GUARD is informed by W W Martin, the marble cutter, through whom it was ordered. Immediately upon its arrival it will be set up and fitting exercises will be held at the time under the auspices of the Eugene Women's Patriotic Republican League, which organization is the originator of the movement to secure the fountain and which has raised a sufficient sum by giving entertainments, dinners, etc, to nearly cover the expense of its purchase, its erection, the freight bill, and other minor matters connected with it. The patriotic and flag-loving people of Eugene will be asked to make up the small deficiency after the fountain is set up and it is expected that they will respond with that generosity for which they are noted.
