## RAILROAD NOTES.

From the Lines East of Eugene—  
Rumors, Etc.

SPRINGFIELD, Dec. 29, 1900.  
A register has been placed at the Mohawk Junction, one mile east of Springfield. All trains passing this point are compelled to record their arrival and departure.

Conductor W R Bullis, who has been in charge of the steam shovel train, has been promoted to the Mohawk run. Conductor E LaForeth succeeds Mr Bullis on the steam shovel train.

There is a rumor that the railroad bridge across the Willamette at Springfield will not be built this coming year.

The opening of the Mohawk branch and a time schedule thereon leaves this run to the oldest employee desiring the same. It is said there will be strong competition for the run, as it is considered a very desirable job, both in hours and pay.

C S Freeland will leave for his home in California in a few days. Mr Freeland has had charge of the construction of the Mohawk branch, and has completed his work in this line.

Probably the slowest time made on any railroad in this country is that of the Mohawk branch. This run through a level valley country from Springfield to Wendling, a distance of sixteen miles, takes only 1 hour and 45 minutes to get over the road. Try it a trip. You may never see another chance to travel so slow by rail.

Thursday afternoon the steam shovel broke down and necessitated the taking of the same to the car shops at Portland for repairs. It was taken down by an extra Thursday night and returned to Naton early this Saturday morning, and is now at its old stand digging dirt. The trestle is being rapidly filled and in about two weeks work of filling on the McKenzie bridge trestle will commence. It is estimated it will take four months to fill this trestle.
