SAW INDIAN MURDERERS OF WHITMAN HUNG.

To readers of Pacific coast and Oregon history the Whitman massacre seems far in the misty past though, in fact, it occurred but little more than a half century ago, November 29, 1847. That is a short time, comparatively, for an old settled country, but a long measure for new country. It was in June of that year that Eugene Skinner built his donation claim cabin at the west end of Skinner's Butte.

One man, at least, is living who saw justice meted out to the Indians who were responsible for that massacre, W. C. Johnson of Oregon City, now nearly seventy. He writes the Oregonian an account of the hanging of the principals engaged in the brutal murder of the missionary party, among the latter Mrs. Spaulding and Mrs. Whitman, the first white women whose blue eyes looked into the black orbs of the aboriginal daughters of the Columbia. They came to their missions with the Cayuses and Nez Percés in 1836. Mr. Johnson writes:

"Among the cases tried in my youthful days I remember best that of the Indians who were arrested and tried for the murder of Dr. Marcus Whitman and others, leading to what is known as the Cayuse Indian War. These Indians were tried with as much judicial care for their rights as would have been any white person accused of a similar crime. The court appointed an earnest and energetic lawyer to guard the interests of these savages, and scrupulous care seemed to be taken in all the proceedings to give them each the benefit of every doubt, and to secure them against every unreasonable prejudice. They were justly convicted, and executed later on, at the south end of Main street, in Oregon City."

"As my mind reverts to the scene when these Indians were hanged, I remember one incident which is worthy of record. Joseph L. Meek was United States marshal and controlled the proceedings. His younger brother, commonly called Steve Meek, thought the Indians had been unjustly condemned, and came on the ground and begged his brother not to carry out the judgment of the court, asserting that it was unjust to apply the same law to them that would properly be applied to civilized and intelligent persons. I shall never forget how Joseph, (the marshal) stood erect about six feet two inches, commanded his brother to stand aside, saying: 'Steve, it is not Joe Meek that is hanging these men, but the United States Marshal.'

"And the ax descended, the ropes were severed, and the seven murderers were sent into eternity. The law was vindicated. The marshal had done his duty; and then the man turned away to weep with his brother Steven over the penalty of ignorance, superstition and savagery."

THE HOSPITAL.

Site Purchased for Erection of Building.

WILL GO UP IMMEDIATELY.

Dr. Paine & Kuykendall today purchased the J. T. Rowland property, on Willamette street opposite the residence of Dr. Kuykendall, as a site for the erection of the new hospital building. The contract will be let within ten days and it is thought by Feb. 10 the building will be ready for use. The residence now standing on the property will form a part of the new building. The roof will be raised and otherwise remodeled. A wing 16x32 feet and two stories high will be built on to the old structure, and when complete will be a substantial and imposing structure.

Dr. Paine, when called on at his office by a GUARD reporter today said that the hospital will be furnished throughout with the most modern appliances obtainable and it will be strictly a first class institution in every respect. On the lower floor of the building will be located the surgery and several wards, and on the upper floor there will be two wards, hospital beds, etc., will be the latest pattern, electric lights will be used, hot and cold water will be had, a sewerage system will be put in and everything for the comfort and convenience of the patients will be furnished.

Dr. Paine says that further improvements will be made on the property later on in the way of removing several outbuildings and improving and beautifying the grounds.

It is probable that after the hospital has been in running order a school for trained nurses will be established in connection with the institution.

This hospital will not be for the exclusive use of the employees of the Booth-Kelly company, as has been generally understood, but will be open to the public. No doubt in time it will be one of the best institutions of its kind in the state.
