ATTEMPTED MURDER

Murray Wade Stabs W. G. Evans, Trying to Kill Him.

STABBED FOUR TIMES.

SALEM, Jan. 10.—At 12:20 o'clock this (Thursday) morning, Murray Wade, son of W L Wade of North Salem, committed a murderous assault on Will G Evans, salesman in the book store of the W H Borchardt Company, by knocking him down and stabbing him four times.

The explanation given of the awful occurrence by friends of the injured man, is that the assault was the result of jealousy. It seems that a young lady, to whom Wade has been paying some attentions, was escorted to the hall of the Entre Nous Club in the Tloga block, last night, being accompanied by the young lady's sister and the latter's escort, O V Allen. After the dance the two young couples went to a restaurant for refreshments, leaving the ladies' residence about 12:30 o'clock this morning, going up Chemeketa street. Mr Allen and his escort walked about fifty feet ahead of the other couple, when opposite the residence of Hon A N Gilbert, corner of Chemeketa and Liberty streets, Murray Wade suddenly appeared by the side of Mr Evans, and with some blunt weapon, believed to have been a club or a rock, knocked the latter down, stunning him. The next instant Wade threw himself upon his prostrate victim, and drove a knife blade into his right breast, inflicting a wound over an inch deep and 3 1/2 inches long. A second blow struck Mr Evans' side about 9 inches below the first wound, cutting a gash an inch deep and two inches long. The third penetrated the calf of the unfortunate man's left leg and a fourth drove the blade into the right leg below the knee, the steel penetrating an inch into the bone, when the blade broke.

Wade was apprehended and is now in the hands of the officers at the city hall. He was found at home in bed.

SEWING FOR SOLDIERS.

Red Cross Society Busy at Frank's Hall.

A busy scene presented itself to a GUARD reporter when he visited Frank's hall this afternoon. Quite a large number of ladies of the Red Cross Society of Eugene, besides others, were busy with their needles and sewing machines making supplies for Uncle Sam's soldier boys who will sail from San Francisco for the Philippines early next month. Miss Therese Friendly, secretary of the society, informed the reporter that the ladies will have made this afternoon 117 comfort bags or "housewives," as the Second Oregon men called them. These bags are made to carry in the pocket and are supplied with an abundance of buttons, needles, pins, safety pins, thread, etc, and are greatly appreciated by the soldiers. The ladies are to be highly commended for their charitable work in this line.

PETITION FOR STEEL BRIDGE

Across The Coast Fork at Cottage Grove.

For a long time it has been apparent that the old wooden bridge across the Coast Fork, connecting the two natural divisions of the town of Cottage Grove, has seen its best days and needs to be replaced by a new one adequate to meet the demands of the heavy traffic thereon. Today a committee representing the citizens of Cottage Grove consisting of R M Veatch, Dr Shapp, Ben Lurch and Chas Vanderburg, presented a petition to the county court now in session, asking that body to authorize the building of a modern steel bridge in place of the old structure. The petition bears the names of 130 representative citizens of that town. The court took the matter under advisement.
