SUGGESTION TO THE COUNTY COURT.

The washing out of the drift-fender above the Eugene wagon bridge, with the consequent loss of a portion of the bridge approach, was due to faulty plans. When piling are driven in the gravel at places where they may be subjected to a strong current they should be protected by a brush mattress covered with rock.

A small extra outlay in the building of the fender would have saved considerable extra cost, besides the annoyance to the public through obstruction of travel. "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

A walk along the county road north of the Eugene bridge discloses the defects of the thoroughfare. The road has been swept clean as a floor by the high water. Where occasional patches were made with crushed rock the road is in excellent condition even the smaller pieces of rock resisting the force of the current through the hold obtained on the roadbed through the impact of travel. The rough gravel road plainly show the traveler why he gets jolted when moving over them in a vehicle. The "rocky road to Dublin" could not be much more uneven.

THE ROSE IN ANCIENT TIMES.

Home and Flowers.
 Just as to other things, the Romans followed the example set by the Greeks in the extravagant use of roses. We may truly say that about the middle of the first century Rome had a mania for roses. The demand became so great at all seasons that the dealers resorted to greenhouse cultivation, with remarkable success, so much so that it was one of the main crops of that time. But florists could not furnish all the roses that were needed, and Egypt was called upon to supply the shortage. The warm climate of that country, not unlike that of Georgia, was just suited to bringing roses to perfection. Hundreds of vessels did nothing but carry shiploads of roses from Alexandria and other Egyptian points to southern Italy.

NATIONAL "CHIVALRY" SCHOOL.

OREGON STATE LEGISLATURE

Both Houses Adjourn Until Next Monday Afternoon.

SENATORIAL SITUATION.

Salem, Jan. 17.—Both houses rushed business this forenoon. Already 127 bills have been introduced and read first time in house, while 60 have been introduced and read in the senate.

The senate today held memorial services in respect to the late Senator Al Reed, of Douglas county. They were of a very impressive order.

The committee clerk evil in both houses seems to have been checked.

Joint memorials to the congress of the United States have passed both houses objecting to the transfer of the forest reserves to the agricultural department. The matter pertains to Oregon particularly.

The State printer is covered up with work. Awaiting printed bills both houses adjourned until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

THE SENATORSHIP.

Salem, Jan. 17.—Senator Geo. W. McBride and ex-Senators H. W. Corbett and John H. Mitchell are all here and claim to be hopeful of success.
