PENNSYLVANIA'S SHAME.

The seating of Matthew Stanley Quay as United States senator re-elected from Pennsylvania, yesterday, was made a memorable scene by friends of the senator. Ordinarily a senator re-elected by such means as were used about Harrisburg to return Quay would have preferred no public notice.

Seven members of the Pennsylvania legislature who made the election of Quay possible had solemnly pledged themselves publicly, time and time again, not to vote for him under any circumstance. On the very day that Quay's sham was being celebrated in the senate chamber the opposing Republican members of the Pennsylvania legislature issued an address to the people of their state in which they asserted that "these men," the seven, "have parted company with honor for reasons which they dare not avow." In other words they were bought.

Who will say that United States senators should not be elected by direct vote of the people?

OREGON STATE LEGISLATURE

Members Gone to Portland for a Grand Old Time.

MAY CAUCUS MONDAY

SALEM, Jan 18.—Nearly all the members of the legislature have gone to Portland to stay over Sunday.

The senatorial candidates are with the throng of visiting legislators. Portland will have politics for the next two days.

Prominent Republicans claim that enough names have been signed to a call for a caucus to warrant the calling of the same Monday.

The joint committee appointed to visit the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg and to report on the management of the same went today.

THE TAX LEVY.

The Register Makes Unfair Comparison.

Register Jan. 17.
The county commissioners at their morning session yesterday levied the tax for 1901. The levy was fixed at 21 mills divided as follows:

State.....5 7-10
County.....5
School.....10 3-10

Total.....21

The levy for last year was as follows:

State.....6 3-10
County.....5
School.....10 3-10

Total.....21 3-10

Roads and rock crusher.....2 2

Total.....23 5

By comparing these two reports it is seen that the levy for county purposes this year is 10 3-10 mills as compared with 8 mills for 1900.

The levy makes no provision for payment on courthouse bonds or road work. Further, it is shown that the levy for state and county alone for 1900 was 14 10 mills while for 1901 it is 16 mills, or 17-10 mills higher this year than last.

A REPLY.

To begin with we will give the official 1901 tax levy, which is as follows:

State tax, levied by State board.....5 7-10
State school tax, fixed by law.....5 10-10
County purposes.....5
Roads and bridges.....4
Interest and public debt.....13 10-10

Total State and State School.....20 7-10

Total county expenses, including roads, bridges, interest and payments on indebtedness.....10 3-10

Total State, State School and County.....31 1-10

As will be seen at a glance the levy is 21 mills less for all purposes than last year, while for county purposes it is 10 3-10 mills this year against 12 2, or 1 9-10 mills less for county purposes than last year.

The Register also says the levy "makes no provision for payment on courthouse bonds or road work." This is false. There are no "courthouse bonds" in Lane county and never has been, for the constitution of the state prohibits counties issuing bonds; but there is 13 mills set aside to pay county debt and 4 mills to pay on roads and bridges. The total levy for state and county in 1900 was 14 10 mills while this year it is 16 mills, which is 2 10 mills less than last year.

Why a paper will make such plain falsehoods we cannot guess.
