LANE COUNTY TAX LEVY.

Oregon State Journal Jan 19.

The County Judge and County Commissioners levied the tax last Thursday. For state purposes as levied by the state board last week, the tax is 5.7 mills; for schools, as provided by the law, 5 mills; and for all other county purposes 10.3 mills, making the total levy on taxable property of Lane county, as assessed and equalized for the year 1900 for the state, state school, and county purposes, 21 mills. This is 2.5 mills less than the levy of the previous year.

It is believed that notwithstanding this reduction the bridges and roads can be kept up and bettered somewhat during the present year and some reduction can be made in the county debt, unless roads and bridges should be seriously damaged hereafter by floods or unforeseen causes. The damages to roads and bridges caused by high waters a few days ago will amount to perhaps ten thousand dollars which must be paid out of this tax levy, making it that much more than it otherwise would have been. Also the expenses of two elections have been added during the last six months, which had not been incurred during the last two years, and will not occur again the next two years. The bills for last July, including registration and election expenses, were about double what they ordinarily are, or in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

On account of this unusual expense for two elections during the last six months, and the damage to roads and bridges caused by high waters during the last week, it is estimated that 21 mills will be required to pay running expenses, most of which is fixed by law and cannot be reduced by the court and keep up and improve the roads and bridges, and perhaps make a little reduction in the public debt. If this can be done taxes and the debt can both be reduced next year and during each succeeding year, and surely will be unless floods or some other calamity occurs to prevent.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES.

As neither all of the Portland nor all of the Salem barbers are in favor of the measure it will doubtless have rather rough sailing before it becomes a law. There are those who are opposed to any such compulsory legislation on general principles.

PHILOLOGIAN SOCIETY.

Election of Officers Held Last Night—Prof Washburn's Lecture.

The Philologists met last night with a crowded house. Recitations were delivered by Hemmway and Wagner. Current events were summed up by Oscar Russell and the extemporaneous address of the evening was given by O. B. Tout on the subject, "The Oregon Legislature."

The principal event of the evening was an address by Prof F. L. Washburn of the University. His subject was, "Man and Ape." The Professor showed that the popular views of evolution were not a correct one and that evolutionists do not hold that man was a direct descendant of the ape. The lecture was illustrated by a number of stereopticon views which made plain a striking analogy between the physiological structure and function of the organs of man and of ape. But the Professor left the hearers to draw their own conclusions whether or not they should adopt the theory of evolution from what they had seen and heard during the evening.

Owing to the election of officers the debate was dispensed with. The officers elected for the ensuing term are: President, J. A. Gumber; Vice-President, G. O.
