NEW USE FOR SLUGGERS.

John P. Robertson, the Marion county reformer, has found a use for sluggers. He writes the Salem Statesman:

"Uncle Sam needs, and should at once enlist about a half-dozen John L. Sullivan, Jeffries, Fitzsimmons and Corbett. Send them to the military academy, at West Point, as fourth class men. That their mental deficiency would ever prevent them from getting beyond the fourth class is no valid objection—rather a commendation. That their manners might not be the best—rather uncouth—and that they would be inclined to 'sass' or 'jaw back' at the brutalized first-class men, is all the better. Then allow the first classes to 'call' them out whenever they feel their 'dignity' has been insulted. A few wholesome lessons administered would have a wonderfully civilizing effect."

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WANT OUR MINES

Linn County Trying to Gobble Up Blue River District.

WE WILL NOT ALLOW IT.

For some time the question of annexing to Linn county a small tract of land in the northern part of Lane county has been talked of. This tract was originally a part of Linn, but was given to Lane a dozen years ago. We understand a bill has been introduced in the legislature by a Linn county member to that effect, but the bill as introduced provides for taking in not only that small strip of land, but a greater portion of the Blue River mining district. Maps have been printed conveying the impression that the land to be annexed is only a portion of Lane county drained by the Calapooya river, but these maps are altogether misleading, and in reality Linn county is trying to gobble up our valuable mines, including a great deal of territory drained by the McKenzie river and its tributaries and also about eight miles of road built by Lane county and her citizens. The contemplated county line will run three-fourths of a mile south of the "Lucky Boy" mine and takes in nearly all of Gold Hill. If the bill, which is now in the hands of a legislative committee, becomes a law, Lane county will lose the "Lucky Boy," the "Sunset," and other valuable mines. In fact all the claims owned by Eugene men in the Blue River district.

Are the people of Eugene and Lane county going to allow this encroachment on our territory without doing something to prevent it? Steps must be taken in the matter immediately. A meeting of our business men should be had at once to act in the matter, and our delegation to the legislature instructed to fight the bill to the bitter end.

We are informed that the Linn county people are diligently working for the passage of the bill and if our citizens want to see the large and growing trade of the Blue River mines retained for Eugene they will do all in their power to defeat the bill. If Linn county gets this tract of land, the county will construct roads to the mines and the trade will be diverted to Brownsville and Albany, but as long as it remains in Lane, Eugene will be sure of the bulk of the business.

MEETING CALLED.

The voters and taxpayers of Lane county are hereby called to meet in the county court room, in Eugene, Oregon, Thursday evening, January 24, 1901, at 7:30 o'clock sharp, to take under consideration the movement in Linn county to annex the Blue River mines. Everybody invited to turn out.

SALEM.

The Senatorial Fight Must Result in a Compromise.

BOTH SIDES CONFIDENT.

Special Correspondence to Guard.
SALEM, Oregon, Jan. 23, 1901.—The first ballot for United States Senator has been taken, and the opposing forces are no nearer a settlement today than they were months ago. The same unseen gulf separates them, and it must be crossed by some method ere a senator can be named. A popular plan to pay such a way, is to be found in side-acking the present noted aspirants for the position and nominating some man whose record is clean, and whose name has not been mixed up in the present mud-die. Such a plan, it has been found upon investigation, meets the approval of a large share of the members and will, no doubt, be the method taken for terminating the struggle.

Corbett's forces are very confident, but confidence don't always place a man in a senatorial chair. The opposition is equally confident, but their confidence is that born of troubled sleep—confidence of a change tomorrow. Since tomorrow never comes, they are evidently chasing a will-o-the-wisp.

Routine work is being rushed rapidly along, more rapidly in fact, than the usual custom. About 300 bills are in the hands of their respective committees, some to die a lingering death and others to pass through the regulation channels and become worthy laws. The committee clerks are compelled to report to the chief clerks at 9 o'clock each day except Monday, and in consequence much more work can be secured from them than has been possible at other sessions.

Hume, who has a cancery at the mouth of the Rogue river, is working hard to keep everyone from catching salmon in that stream, except his employees. In fact he is endeavoring to play the same skin-game on the people, as the Columbia river cannery men are playing. His bill makes it a crime to catch salmon above a given point on the river, and this practically shuts all others, except his fishermen, out from securing salmon for home use. The state house flags float at half-mast today, emblems of our feeling towards England for her honored dead.

Noted Sociologist Coming.

Professor Albion W. Small, head professor of Sociology in Chicago University will be in Eugene, Thursday, January 24th. It is hoped that he will consent to lecture on some topic in sociology, in Deady Hall, at 8 o'clock that evening. The public will be welcome. In case it should not be possible for him to lecture, notice will be inserted in the daily press.

Professor Small has had a large experience in civic matters in Chicago, and can speak with authority on sociological questions.

Dr. Holt's Lecture.

The lecture at the State University this forenoon by Rev. Dr. Holt was a very rich treat. The audience was most enthusiastic in the reception which it gave the eloquent words of the speaker.
