PORTLAND'S SHAME.

That Portland Police Commission deserve something very bad—worse than they can get in this world—for not having kept faith with the gamblers, men who have openly violated the laws of the city of Portland and the state of Oregon under police protection for months past. Here is a wall from a gambling house proprietor, published in the Oregonian of the 26th:

"This order to close has nearly taken the breath from me. It is a surprise. The usual monthly fine was paid January 1, and we expected that the money would give us the right to do business until January 31. The Police Commissioners have not treated us fairly, and have not allowed us to get our money's worth. Still, I'll close up gambling Saturday night and obey the law, because I have to."

It was time for Rev. Snyder and his "reformers" to make a move against not only open violations of law, but the pollution of the courts of justice and their agents, the police, through connivance and open partnership with crime. It is surprising that men with any sense of morality could have handled such money and placed it in a public fund.

FOREST UTILIZATION.

Roseburg Review, Jan. 19.

Robt Alexander, of Comstock, who was in town this week devising plans for the manufacture of ship knees from the stumps and roots of the trees felled for logs and piling. Formerly, in the logging business, more than half the product of a forest, he believes, was wasted. The stumps were cut high from the ground and a long piece from the top of the tree was deemed too small for sawing into lumber, and this, with the burning of the slabs, etc., made a great waste of valuable material. With the small top section used for piling, the main trunk for lumber, and the stump and large roots for ship knees, and a proper utilization of the slabs, the whole tree would be used for valuable purposes and prove of correspondingly greater worth to timber men.

Messrs Campbell & Alexander are preparing for the construction of an extensive tramway near Hudson, to facilitate the handling of their cordwood, piling and logging business, and will probably employ 150 men the present season. Thus utilizing the whole product, the land will be left practically clear and much of it can be utilized for gardens, orchards, vineyards and pasture lands, thus adding to the permanent wealth of the country.

The Philippine Commission evidently believe they have struck the insurgent Filipinos a body blow in making proclamation that all Filipinos in arms after March will be held ineligible for public office. That is about all a Federal officeholder can see—the public test.

In a region like South Africa the belligerent which is at liberty to

choose the time and place of attack, and which has no capital or base of operations to defend, has an immense advantage over its opponent, especially when that opponent has hundreds of miles of communication to defend. The Boers have all the advantage, except as to ultimate resources.

Federal office-holders are not wearing any leather off their boot-soles for the Corbett cause. This leads the Oregonian to dimly suggest that "there are actually one or two lobbyists at Salem who are not employees of the United States Government."

The recommendation of Governor Geer that the college be divided by the diversion of part of the funds to a similar institution to be located in Eastern Oregon, naturally does not take well with Corvallis people. They claim, and their contention seems well founded, that a division of the college at the present time would result in the two financially crippled institutions in place of the college that is now a credit to the state.

IN EULOGY OF THE QUEEN.—An interesting meeting was held in the Congregational church last night, the members of the Presbyterian, Episcopal and Congregational churches uniting in special meeting in memory of Queen Victoria. The pastor, Rev Mac D Wallace, presided at the meeting and Revs J A Cleland and D E Loveridge delivered addresses touching on the religious character of the Queen. Excellent music was rendered by the choir and Rev E C Sanderson, dean of the Divinity School, delivered a touching prayer. The meeting was largely attended.

Salem, Jan. 28.—The bill authorizing a special tax levy for Portland though passed and signed will have to be passed again on account of an error which originated in the senate.
