THE TROTTER RECORD.

The yearling filly by Directum, 2:00 1/4, out of "Tuna, 2:12 1/4, is described as a very fast bay trotter.

The new performer, Justine M, 2:28, is by Clay King, 2:27 1/4, out of Jane II, 2:20 1/4, by Alden Goldsmith.

There is a fast green brother to Free Bond, 2:04 1/4, pacing, to wagon, owned in Canada. He is called Joe Letter.

It is reported that Red Will, the 5-year-old colt by Red Wilkes, out of Nancy Lee, dam of Nancy Hanks, 2:04, has trotted a trial in 2:30.

W. W. Blair, widely known as the gentleman who trained and drove Maud S to her record of 2:08 1/4, is working in a store in Philadelphia.

The pacer Connor during his turf career has won 48 out of the 79 races in which he has started and has paced and trotted 136 heats in standard time.

John Hussey is wintering a great green trotter at Independence, Ia. He is by Keeler, 2:15 1/4, dam by Axtell, 2:12, and worked a mile at Readville last August in 2:11 1/4.

Sam Earing has in training at Bethlehem, Pa., a 3-year-old filly by Prose that has paced miles around 2:20 and a 3-year-old, Ora Wilkes, trotter, that has shown miles below 2:30.

A fast green pacer held over for 1901 is Ontime, by Online (4), 2:04, out of the dam of Be Sure (4), 2:00 1/4. He is owned by H. Conklyn, Springfield, O., and showed a 2-year-old trial in 2:10.

One of the fastest 2-year-olds of 1900 is My Star, by Wilstar, 2:17 1/4, son of Robert McGregor. This colt made a half mile record at Rushville, Ind., of 1:08 1/4 and has shown a full mile in 2:10.

The stable of Senator John McCarthy of New York made 30 starts, won 18 races, 9 second money, 2 thirds and 1 fourth and divided third and fourth once. The winnings of the string amounted to \$18,400.

FRILLS OF FASHION.

Long gold chains are heavier than they were and interspersed with links of enamel.

Some of the wide trimmed hats are faced with soft breads, wings and fur, and the effect is very becoming to some faces.

Shoulder knots of panne velvet made with the ends finished with gold aguliettes are used on both day and evening gowns.

Low, broad hats of black velvet or shirred tulle are very much worn, and shirred net is introduced with the velvet with pretty effect.

No gloves and many rings seem to be the fashion among some women at the theater, but you will notice if they are swell that the sleeves are very long, extending well over the hand and quite transparent.

Bones are made of white poppies with black centers and finished with platted chiffon ends. In fact, it is difficult to say of what they are not made, so great is the variety in the shops, and whatever the material they are very full, with long, soft ends.

Yards and yards of narrow ribbon velvet are used on evening gowns, especially those made of net with flounces, trimmed with graduated rows of velvet. Printed panne ribbon is used on tulle gowns, and so is white velvet ribbon, which is very effective.

Short dressy coats of black velvet made with fancy vests and fur undersleeves are one of the winter modes in which young women delight. Lace outlined with gold applied to cream cloth is one style of vest, and another is made of delicate brocaded satin, the flowers being outlined with the gold cord.—New York Sun.

ORCHARD AND GARDEN.

For a family orchard many varieties may be planted and few trees of a variety, so as to have fruit every season and the whole season.

Slight elevations are a safer place for the grape than bottom lands, as the vines and fruit are not so apt to be injured by early or late frosts.

The deficiency of potash in the soil of peach orchards is shown in the spindling growth of limbs and twigs. Potash makes firm, stocky peach wood.

In almost all orchards, especially if old, there will be found some trees that are only lumberers of the ground. Grub them out and put something of value in their places.

It is the freezing and thawing in the months after January that hurts the strawberry beds; hence they should be well mulched as soon as the ground freezes sufficiently hard.

The cause of moss appearing on the stems of apple and other fruit trees is wet, cold, undrained land or an excessively humid climate. Good drainage is one remedy.—St. Louis Republic.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

A new island has been formed out at sea about ten miles from the mouth of the Rhine.

Vital statistics published recently in Norway show that about 7,000 inhabitants of that country die annually from consumption.

The Buffalo Bird Protective society defends the English sparrow, ascribing to the birds the disappearance in that vicinity of the cankerworm.
