FILIPINO SOLDIERS.

Ten Regiments of Natives Authorized to Be Organized.

New York, Jan 27.—After the passage of the army reorganization bill, Secretary Root will call permission to Major-General McArthur to organize 10 regiments of Filipino infantry and cavalry, says the Washington correspondent of the Herald. This action will be taken upon the recommendation of the Taft commission. The commission says that while the American soldiers are unopposed in war they do not make the best policemen in the Philippines. Native troops in the main, the commission believes, should be offered by Americans.

EXCITING EXPERIENCE.

An Incident of the Recent Freshet On the Siuslaw.

An interesting item has just reached our ears, which though rather old is worth printing. During the recent freshet on the Siuslaw river, Frank Hadley, Morris Johnson and Hazen Johnson had charge of a raft carrying a large amount of provisions for a logging crew who were making a big drive down the river at that time.

The men with the raft were drifting along behind the logs with not a thought of danger, when suddenly they ran against a huge drift with such force that the raft, with all the provisions, was sunk and the three men were left to the mercy of the raging waters. It is said that they were carried under the drift by the current, but extricated themselves in some manner and finally, by the aid of passing logs, reached shore and safety. Only one of the men could swim and it was remarkable that all three were not drowned, as the water was high and quite swift.

The amusing part of the incident occurred after the men had succeeded in reaching shore. It is said that Hadley was so badly frightened that he climbed a tree. While sitting on a limb with tears rolling down his cheeks, he was asked if he was hurt. "No," said he, "but I've lost my job."
