UNREASONABLE PREJUDICE.

The Cottage Grove Leader in urging that a steel bridge be built across the Coast Fork river at that place takes occasion to say that the people of that part of the "county have been taxed to build a fine courthouse and jail in order that Eugene may shine and keep step with the foremost towns of Oregon," and "a fine steel bridge at Springfield," etc.

If the Cottage Grove editor—and he is a level-headed gentleman—had considered a moment he would not have written such stuff. The court house and jail were not built that Eugene might "shine," but for the benefit of the entire county. There was no extravagance in their building, while the old structures were endured not a few years after they were entirely inadequate for public needs. In fact the confinement of a human being in that old stone jail, no matter for what offense, was nothing but a public crime against humanity. We know whereof we write. Not mentioning the small, ill-ventilated, inconvenient public offices in the old courthouse, the invaluable county records had no security from fire, except that provided by the city of Eugene. The record vault would not have withstood the burning of the courthouse, except by aid of the fire department sustained by taxes of the citizens of Eugene.

We cannot believe that the Cottage Grove paper represents the sentiment of the people of that community. It has become chronic for Cottage Grove newspapers to vent their spleen against Eugene, and for no other reason but it is the county seat. It is not right nor just. Eugene pays a large share of taxes—about one-fifth—is the natural trade center of the county, and has never failed to encourage improvements in roads and bridges for every portion of the county. Our people even would say nothing against the building of a steel bridge across the hundred foot river at Cottage Grove, though with the abundance of timber at hand it would seem like waste to place a steel bridge across such a narrow stream.

The House and Senate caenders of the Oregon state legislature show not a few bills introduced "by request." Why any legislator should introduce a bill that he is ashamed to stand sponsor for is a pertinent question.

The proposition to divide the fund provided for the maintenance

of the Oregon Agricultural College with a similar institution to be located somewhere in Eastern Oregon, will be met with the grave objection that both colleges would thereby be crippled from lack of sufficient funds. Better have one strong institution than two weak ones.

Disconsolate Portland gamblers—now without occupation—assert all manner of financial ills for the town on account of suppression of the vice. That reminds us that the fly on the coach wheel made exclamation "How we go around!" or of similar import. Gambling has less to do with Portland prosperity than the fly with moving the coach wheel. On the contrary it is an eater, destroyer, tearer down instead of a producer and builder-up.

Harris Bill Passed the House This Afternoon.

NOT A DISSENTING VOICE.

SALEM, Jan. 30.—The House passed a bill at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon for an appropriation for the University of Oregon of \$47,500 annually.

The measure passed without a dissenting voice.

The amount heretofore received by the University from the state has been \$30,000 per year.

New School Buildings.

EUGENE, Jan. 30.
EDITOR GUARD: The article in this morning's Register, signed "A Taxpayer," advocating the erection of a "good modern commodious school building of eight rooms" in the eastern part of town, meets with my most hearty approval. "The time has passed in the history of Eugene, I hope, when it or the school district shall erect anything cheap, and the proposition made to erect a "six-room school" should be frowned down. In the proposed new building the mistakes made in the Geary should be avoided. The new building should have a high basement with a cement floor, which could be used as a play ground for the children in cold and wet weather. It should be steam heated as is our courthouse. It will be better to spend a few thousand dollars more and have modern improvements than to be parsimonious and have an unsanitary structure that will undermine the health of our little ones. That is the trouble with the Geary building. In the new building the heating and ventilation should be according to the latest scientific methods. "Taxpayer" suggests that we bond the district for \$15,000. I would suggest that we bond it for \$40,000 and erect a \$15,000 building on our lot in eastern part of town and also a \$25,000 high school building where the Central school now stands. The money could be secured at 4 per cent, making the interest \$1600 per annum, which a one-mill tax would now nearly cover. In 25 years, when the bonds mature, the assessed valuation of this school district will be such that a three-mill tax will easily pay off the entire indebtedness. Money invested in good school buildings bring in the best kind of returns. It will attract the best class of people from the East, and if Eugene should conclude to build these two buildings it would be advertised far and near, and this, with its growing University, at the head of which is a man of good sense and rare tact, would give us such a prestige as nothing else could give us, and would bring to Eugene the most desirable immigrants.
