LEGISLATIVE HUMOR.

The barber's Sunday bill provides that any person engaging in the barber business on Sunday shall be liable to a fine of \$10, or imprisonment for five days for the first offense; for each subsequent offense a fine of \$25 to \$50, or by imprisonment ten to twenty-five days.

The humorist who drew the bill added an emergency clause declaring that "as there is urgent need for the relief of overworked persons engaged in the barbering business" the act should take effect from and after approval by the governor.

This special state legislation sought by a few individuals to regulate their period of labor will be hailed as a blessed omen by not a few constitutionally tired individuals who would rest seven days a week. If the state has the right to say labor shall remain idle Sunday, why not Monday and the other five days? State paternalism is the remedy for all ills these days.

SOME HARD WORDS.

John Redmond, leader of the United Irish party, speaking at Wexford, Ireland, Monday, said some bitter words regarding England's dead queen. And there was much truth in them. Redmond said:

All the world was assembled in London, not in triumph, but in sorrow, around the bier of her who, to English people, at least, will live in history as a great constitutional sovereign. But Ireland, of all her empire, stood apart, sullen and dissatisfied. Ask your English rulers why. It is not because the Irish race is hard of heart and cold of nature; it is not because of any want of respect for the personal virtues of the lady from whose weary hand the scepter of power is snatched by death.

It is because the reign which is just closed has been for Ireland and all the Irish race more disastrous than any reign in 800 years. During this reign 1,500,000 of our own people have perished by famine; 5,000,000 have emigrated to other lands. Under the sway of this monarchy, there have been 40 coercion acts depriving Ireland of her constitutional rights. What has converted Canada from a land of rebellion to a happy colony would transform Ireland tomorrow from a disaffected to a contented land.

Queen Victoria's closing hours were rendered most miserable by thoughts of war—most horrible war. Her poor, shrunken body may not escape the specter that haunted her. This sad reminder of man's mortality will be given a

confined place on a gun carriage in the funeral procession, and thereafter will be placed aboard a funeral ship which will steam eight miles between lines of warships, each in turn belching forth salutes that would sound horrible if those dead ears could hear.

The latest thing in unions is an organization of coffin-makers and grave-diggers in New York City under the auspices of the American Federation of Labor. Organizers of grave-diggers are to be sent all over the country, and a national union of mortuary trades will be formed. The embalmers will be taken in, as will also the shroud-makers. In Chicago a grave-diggers' union has also been organized.

The Salem Young Men's Christian Association only finds work for winter months; at least the secretary writes the GUARD that the copy donated will not be wanted for several months. It is the old story. Churches open Sundays, but the old raring, raging devil goes about at all times seeking whom he may entrap into his tropical realm.

Bismarck has a poor opinion of the new king of England. He is credited with having said that "he is the only crown prince in Europe never seen on a battlefield." That makes little difference with the English public. Nowadays the English king is not a heroic figure. He is a mere figurehead.

In a breach of promise in Idaho, a letter from the plaintiff was read in which she told the defendant, Thomas Jerry Wells, that he had "intoxicated" her with love. "Tom and Jerry" have become famous for producing just that effect upon all who dally with them.

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PASSED THE SENATE

University Appropriation Bill Will Become a Law.

READY FOR GOVERNOR'S SIGNATURE.

 Salem, Or, Jan 31, 3:30 p. m.—The Senate has just passed the House bills appropriating \$47,000 annually for the University of Oregon and \$25,000 annually for the state agricultural college. Both measures are now ready for Gov. Geer's signature. The agricultural college bill passed unanimously. On the University bill Howe voted no.

BLUE RIVER LINE

Bill Amended Fixing It On the Summit Between Linn and Lane.

Salem, Jan 31.—In the senate this afternoon the bill introduced by Senator Kelly of Linn ceding to Linn county nearly all the Blue River mining district, was amended so that the summit of the mountain between the Clatsop and McKenzie rivers will be the line between the two counties. This leaves all the leading mines, including the Lucky Boy, Sunset, Treasurer, and Eugene mines, in Lane county. It will be hard to determine the line at some places.
