OREGONIAN INTOLERANCE.

When it comes to talking section the Oregonian may well recall troublous times not many years ago when cities and communities about Portland, in this Northwest, run out unoffending Chinese, and in some instances maltreated them. It did not happen in Portland to any considerable extent for the very simple reason that the militia was held in readiness to protect the Chinamen. That serious trouble was averted in the Oregon metropolis was due to the fact that no spark reached the powder magazine. As it was not a few Chinamen left Portland, and those resident there did not unnecessarily expose their persons in public places. That note in free silver sections look-monstrous large to Oregonian vision. It is not prejudice with the Oregonian—simply intolerance. Here is a recent screed from the Portland paper.

There is nothing remarkable in the fact that lynchings have taken place in Kansas or Colorado, or Southern Indiana or Southern Ohio. The mob spirit prevailed on the Kansas border at an early day. "Border ruffianism" was contributed to by both Kansas and Missouri before the Civil War, during the war and after the war. Southern Ohio and Indiana were largely settled from slave states, while Colorado has a population that has always been passionately devoted to free silver and free riot. It mobbed Roosevelt, voted for Bryan and then roasted a negro alive.

Southern Ohio and Indiana, and Colorado cast majorities for Bryan. Therein lies their offense. It would doubtless please the Oregonian better if some southern state had been at fault, but as this negro lynching and burning is confined to northern states the editor make the best of his dilemma and charges the offense up to free silver and contiguity to the South. A great head that!

A TARIFF PHASE.

The sugar trust is causing trouble by insisting that a cargo of Russian sugar, on which they claim a government export bounty has been paid, be fined a duty equivalent to the export bounty. Russia protests and threatens to retaliate by imposing a prohibitive duty against American made goods. As our highly protected iron industry is placing large orders with Russia they are protesting against any extra duty being added to the sugar.

And all this time Americans are paying more for sugar and iron than the Russians. President McKinley's protective tariff and the trusts formed by the protected industries are responsible for this robbery of American consumers.

Captain Hart, of the United States engineer corps, in his report to the war department recommending the removal of the obstructions of the Columbia at The Dalles, says of the Idaho and Eastern Oregon timber: "There is said to be much valuable timber in the Clearwater river valley. The white pine now standing in this valley is estimated by the Lewiston, Idaho, Commercial Club at 2,700,000,000 feet, lumber measure, and is said to cover 270,000 acres. In the Grand Ronde valley, in Eastern Oregon, there is likewise said to be 250,000 acres of yellow pine standing, amounting to 2,500,000,000 feet, lumber measure, of merchantable lumber."

Aashland, according to the Portland Mercury, will not be a dry town according to reports received from there this week. The city council has granted a liquor license to the proprietors of the Hotel Oregon, and will probably grant similar licenses to the other saloons. The city voted to abolish the saloons at their last municipal election. The report is also circulated to the effect that over \$4,000 has been contributed by wholesale liquor dealers in San Francisco and Portland to contest the matter in the courts, should the city decline to issue the licenses when the applications were made.

The Boer peace commission is not a very desirable place. The telegraph reports that General Dewet shot one agent and flogged two others. Dewet evidently looks upon these self appointed envoys about as the revolutionary patriots did on Benedict Arnold. In Arnold's case it only lacked the catching.
