### All Railway Measures Killed In House by Decisive Vote.

### MINING BILLS PASSED.

### Booth's Bill Protecting Hotel Men Passed.

#### HARRIS' MINING BILL SUCCESSFUL.

SALEM, Oregon, Feb. 13.—Representative Poorman's bill regulating liabilities of masters to servants failed.
