MEDFORD'S FINANCES.

The Medford "Mail" of last week says: "The Medford city council is, in street parlance, 'up against the real thing.' At the regular session of the board, held on Tuesday evening of this week, some astounding facts were disclosed. Treasurer Straight's report was read and from it was learned that the town was about \$69,000 in debt, and that during the last two years the town's indebtedness had increased \$19,000. This increase was mainly due to the purchase of the electric light plant and the putting in of the sewerage system. The board also found that the electric light plant was in debt; that its operation since the purchase of the plant last April had been \$1000 in excess of the income from lights. Five hundred dollars of this deficit had been transferred from the general fund, which leaves the plant, as above stated, \$500 in debt. When to this is added the six per cent interest on the light plant purchase price, it is found that the plant has actually cost the town \$1500 during the last ten months. The council also found that the receipts for water rents during the past year had been \$1400. The amount paid for wood for the water system during this time was \$1800, engineer's salary, \$480. Besides these items there are the repairs made and oil used. The water committee has estimated that the expenditures have been at least \$1000 in excess of receipts."

NOT DOWN ON THE PROGRAM.

Montana Miner: "An incident, not down on the program, occurred at the lodge meeting of the Maocabees Saturday evening, and the details which have leaked out are too good to remain unpublished. Among the candidates to be initiated was Bert Chamberlain, who has spent a few years among the cowboys and is fond of fun. Some one well up in the mysteries of the work had evidently been coaching the candidate, for at an interesting part of some side degree, where a voice calls out in the semi-darkness, "Seize the Villain!" and the guides step forward to bind the supposed victim to a tree, Bert sprang back, drew out two revolvers, saying "No you don't," and began firing right and left. The lodge room was quickly cleared, and it is said some of the guides actually dropped out of the second story window to avoid the carnage. Purchase of S. P. By U. P. Might Result in Benefit.

O. & C. R. R.'S FINANCIAL STATUS.

While there is no information to be had locally regarding the purchase of control of the Southern Pacific by the Harriman syndicate and in the interest of the Union Pacific, says the Oregonian, there is much local speculation as to what the new deal means for this country. It is assumed by some that it means a closer affiliation of the Oregon lines—the O. R. & N. and the Oregon & California. The latter is now operated by the Southern Pacific Company under a lease that will not expire until 1927, but it lacks a good deal of paying expenses, and it is not doubted that the Harriman interests will do something to improve the status of the property, even if it should be necessary to bring it through a bankruptcy court.

The Oregon & California (Southern Pacific lines in Oregon) is not a necessary part of the Southern Pacific system, as the O. R. & N. is of the Union Pacific. It plays a comparatively insignificant part in transcontinental business. Its main office is that of a local carrier. A transcontinental line must get to the coast; it is not obliged to have connections paralleling the seashore. Such roads fill the office of feeders merely for the main system. This has been the relation of the Oregon & California to the main lines of the lessee corporation. It might be eliminated from the Southern Pacific without impairing the value or earning power of the main system, and if those in control find there is something to be gained by a realignment of the property—by combining it with the O. R. & N., for example—it is not doubted that such disposition will be made of it. And the consensus of opinion is that there is something to be gained by such an arrangement.

It is well known that the Oregon & California does not pay expenses; in fact, that the annual deficit is about \$500,000. July 1, 1899, the liabilities of the company exceeded its assets by \$5,421,827.

The move that was begun nearly a year ago to cut the Oregon & California lines from the Southern Pacific, in the interest of the Northern Pacific, was believed to expose the desire or willingness of the Southern Pacific to be rid of its Oregon lines. That was before the death of Mr. Huntington. Now that totally different alignments have been made, it would not surprise many well informed people to see the Oregon & California reduced to a working basis and yoked up with the O. R. & N. The separate official organization of the O. R. & N. has every appearance of permanence and an alliance of the Oregon & California with it is regarded as not only among the probabilities, but also highly desirable.

In various other ways the changed control of the Southern Pacific is deemed in the interest of Oregon. If it should result in nothing more than getting the Oregon & California on a proper financial basis, and thus give an efficient management a show to make a record, it would be much. It is believed, however, that the new influence will be more favorable to Oregon than the Huntington influence was, and more favorable to Portland. This is expected to help Western Oregon in innumerable ways.
