ory of teaching, grammar, bookkeep-
ing, English literature, civil govern-
ment.

Friday—Physiology, geography,
physical geography, mental arith-
metic, school law.

Saturday—Botany, plane geometry,
general history, psychology.

THE SENATORSHIP

Claimed That Mitchell Had 43
Votes Today, but Did
Not Use Them.

WANTS FULL 46.

Salem, Feb. 13.—The senatorial situa-
tion is undergoing a slight change.

Corbett is trying a smooth game. He
has a few members who will finally
vote for him, and these remain in the
ranks of the opposition. However, one
comes over to Corbett every few days,
thus endeavoring to convince those of
weak faith that recruits are coming in-
to the ranks, and the faithful are using
this as an argument for others to go
and do likewise. Mitchell can muster
about forty-three votes in the joint
convention today, yet he will not be
presented as an open candidate until
he is sure of forty-six. Should he be
unable to hold forty-six votes, it is
claimed that Smith will be seriously
considered as a candidate. Hence the
question now stands, Smith or —

—well that's the rub. That little
word "or" has so far eluded the watch-
fulness of every politician, candidate
and newspaper man in Oregon, in so
far as continuing the sentence is con-
cerned.

The GUARD has published news
relative to this matter from twelve to
twenty-four hours in advance of any
other newspaper in Oregon, and will
continue to do so in the future if pos-
sible. Pointers in regard to the situa-
tion are hard to get, and it is only by
the utmost care and watchfulness that
anything can be learned of actions to
be taken in the future relative to it.
However, suggestions here and there
seem to indicate the ultimate defeat of
Corbett.

While nothing material has as yet
transpired, some insight of events to
come are mirrored in present actions
and it seems more probable than ever
that the GUARD's predictions are about
to be realized.

As an example of the statement
made above relative to the dropping
over of Corbett's known supporters
from assumed positions, to their actual
places in Corbett's support, note the
following from the daily Statesman:

"The members of the Legislature are
getting extremely restless at the un-
satisfactory conditions prevailing, with
adjournment less than two weeks
hence. They all agree that an elec-
tion must be had, and they are casting
about for a way out of the difficulty.
What that way will be they do not
say—that is the anti-causous forces
have no explanation to give—but they
are determined to elect, and there is
little doubt they will do so. How
soon Mr Black's example will be fol-
lowed by any considerable number can
not now be predicted, but it is likely to
be very soon."

Fancy Mr Black acting as bell-sheep
for the purpose of leading in weak-
kneed members to the Corbett fold. It
has been known for some time that
Mr Black would cast his support to
the Portland banker, and he is only
acting as his natural inclinations dic-
tate, and has not changed his mind
and been won over, or any thing else
of that kind. It is only an act in the
general scheme to stampede undecided
members to Corbett.

said bounty fund."

Death of Mrs Cheshire.

Mrs Rachel Cheshire died this morn-
ing at 8 o'clock from old age at the
residence of her daughter, Mrs E
Whattam, at the corner of Tenth and
Oak streets, in this city. While old
age was primarily the cause of the
death, the lady had been confined to
her bed for the last five years from the
effects of a fall.

Mrs Cheshire's maiden name was
Rachel Smith and she was born at
Rutledge, Tennessee, on the 24th day
of May, 1809, therefore being at the
time of her death 91 years, 8 months
and 13 days old, probably the oldest
person in Lane county. She was mar-
ried in 1828 in Tennessee to Edmond
Cheshire who died Aug 31, 1861. In
1874 Mrs Cheshire came to Oregon and
Lane county to reside with her
children, who had come West in an
early day.

Mrs Cheshire was the mother of ten
children, only five of whom survive
her. They are: Mrs E Whattam, Mrs
Mary Fields, W P Cheshire, all of Lane
county, Mrs Amanda Ray, living in
Kansas, and Edmond Cheshire, in
Missouri. She had lived a Christian
all her life, being a member of the
Baptist church.

The funeral will be held at the
Whattam residence Friday morning at
9 a m, to be conducted by Rev J C Rich-
ardson, and the remains will be laid to
rest in Oak Hill cemetery, a few miles
west of Eugene.

The sorrowing family have the sym-
pathy of many friends in Eugene and
Lane county.
