HIT THE AGRICULTURIST.

The New York Journal and Advertiser of February 20th has a London dispatch from W T Stead regarding tariff reprisals being made by Russia against the United States. He writes:

I regard the increase of Russian duties on American iron and steel goods with profound regret. It does not matter much to the American manufacturer if he is temporarily shut out of the Russian market; it matters everything to the Russian consumer that the price of his machinery should not be increased. Portland has a sight for sight-seers in the spanning of the river between the draw pier of the Morrison street bridge and the one on the east by a three hundred and fifty foot steamship. The stern of the vessel rests against one pier and the bow against the other. The vessel is drawing fifteen feet and with the river at a good stage there is an immense pressure against the big iron carrier. So much that river men say there are not enough tow craft in the river to pull the steamer around and straighten her out in the river until the water falls.

The engineer who recommended a drainage tunnel to stop the sliding mountain above the city waterworks reservoir at Portland knew his business. It has practically stopped the sliding movement. Drowned Near Jefferson.

A Jefferson dispatch gives the following account of the drowning at Abraham Crooks' this side of that city Saturday:

The Southam river at this place took an unexpected rise Friday night, and Saturday morning found that portion of Lane county opposite this city under several feet of water, tears nor people not being able to reach the wagon bridge.

The house of Abraham Crooks, located near the wagon bridge, was surrounded by water and Crooks is missing. He lived alone and no doubt is entertained by all people of his death by drowning while trying to reach higher ground. His horse was found, with bridle and halter on, standing on a knoll near the house. The dwelling was entered by means of a skiff, and it was found that the occupant, before leaving, had placed most of the articles on shelves, beyond reach of the water. All day Sunday men searched for the body of Mr Crooks, one of his gloves being found a few hundred yards below the house. The river is falling, and if it continues it is thought probable the body will be found in some of the numerous holes or drifts. Abraham Crooks was a member of a prominent pioneer Lane county family, 45 or 50 years of age.

Later—the remains of Mr Crooks were found this afternoon in a sandy place about half a mile below the bridge, where they had been washed. In trying to ride his horse out he had evidently been thrown off and drowned.
