THE WOOLEN MILL TRUST.

As an instance of how the trusts do business the annual report of the American Woollen Company is of interest. The Company report shows that twenty-five New England mills are in the combine, with a capital stock of \$49,501,000. Of this twenty millions is preferred stock and was paid seven per cent. The undivided profits amounted to \$2,105,000, a little over seven per cent on the balance of twenty-nine millions of common stock.

While seven per cent is not an excessive return even on such a large investment, it does not tell the whole story of trust profit-making. These trusts are capitalized at two to three times the actual value of their properties in order to deceive the public by reports reasonable interest returns. The woollen trust has paid its stockholders not less than fifteen per cent on the actual investment. And that is outrageous, a robbery of the public under tariff and trust protected laws.

Great Britain is probably about through with the Boer war and the statement of total expenses to date of one hundred and forty million pounds sterling, about seven hundred million dollars, may be accepted as the price Great Britain pays for her latest territorial exploitation. Such another victory would throw the country into a bankruptcy court. There is some satisfaction to the Boers in the thought that while being deprived of their liberties a very large addition to the public debt has been saddled on their conquerors.

Matthew and Priscilla Grant arrived in this country in 1830. Their descendants to the number of sixty celebrated the three hundredth anniversary of the birth of Priscilla at New York the other evening. The claim was there made that her descendants now number twelve thousand. It might be interesting if some one could figure out what proportion of her blood runs in the veins of these descendants. It would show a very small proportion. Yet she made their existence possible.

Bourke Cockran, the gifted New York orator, claims that the solution of the social problems of the day lies with the church. That would be good logic if the history of past events showed that the church had always been a leader in often been a brake on the wheels of social advancement. Even with free thought to spur it onward the church is no better than its current time.

PROFESSOR COOTE, (AGRICULTURAL), COLLEGE ON ROSE CULTURE.

Rose culture in Oregon is extremely easy, owing to our mild and even climate. All that is necessary is to take the cuttings from the bush in the Fall, that is, during the latter part of October, and put them in the ground where the new bushes are wanted. Do not put the cuttings in the greenhouse or dwelling. If put indoors the leaf buds will develop without a root growth and the cuttings will usually die after starting the leaves. A rose cutting should consist of a piece of the well-matured wood, eight or ten inches in length. Place it in the ground so that there will be only two buds above ground. The buds which would naturally be underground should be removed before setting out the cutting, to prevent the growth of suckers. Cuttings set out the latter part of October may be expected to bloom the following July or August. Roses are great feeders, hence the soil should be rich and deeply cultivated.

Pruning is important if fine flowers are expected. Half of the old wood should be taken off each year. The most satisfactory results are obtained by pruning late in March. This, however, will delay the blooming somewhat, and for early roses it will be well to leave some bushes without pruning.
