GENERAL HARRISON DEAD

Unconscious Several Hours Before He Died--Suffered Greatly Last Night

THE USUAL OUTRAGE; THEN FIRE

CORSICANA, Texas, March 13.—The excited populace took John Henderson the outrager and murderer of Mrs. Younger from the custody of the officers this forenoon. Henderson was taken to the courthouse square and in the presence of a large crowd, some of whom were women, was chained to a stake and burned alive.

GENERAL HARRISON DYING.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 13.—At one o'clock today ex-President Harrison was in a semi-comatose condition, it being impossible to arouse him. He recognized no one about his bedside during the night. He suffered greatly.

HARRISON IS DEAD.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 13.—General Harrison died this afternoon at eight minutes past three o'clock. The cause of death was complications arising from la grippe. [Five o'clock Pacific Coast time—Ed. GUARD.]

[Benjamin Harrison, nineteenth president of the United States, was born in North Bend, Ohio, August 20, 1833. He was a grandson of William Henry Harrison who was elected president in 1840 and died one month after inauguration. He was born in his grandfather's house. Worked on the farm as a boy and young man; graduated at Miami University in 1852. Studied law and located at Indianapolis, his home till death, in 1854. Enlisted in the War of the Rebellion as second lieutenant; soon after was made colonel, and on January 23, 1865, received the brevet of brigadier-general. Was defeated for governor of Ohio in 1876 by a small majority. Was United States senator from Ohio from 1880 till March 3, 1887. Was nominated for president by the republican national convention held at Chicago and elected over Grover Cleveland then president. Four years later he was defeated for re-election by Cleveland.—Ed. GUARD.]

\$300 EXEMPTION STANDS.

New Oregon Assessment Law
Makes No Change.

Salem, Or., March 12.—It has been stated that the \$300 exemption heretofore allowed to householders on the value of their personal property will not be allowed under the new assessment law. This is an error, however. The new law contains a provision that no reduction of assessment shall be allowed on account of indebtedness, but the old law as to the \$300 exemption is not affected by this provision. There has not been for many years an allowance for indebtedness, so the law in this respect is not changed.

BENJAMIN HARRISON.



Born 1833. Died 1901.

General Harrison was in perfect health last Wednesday, and contrary to common report, was not suffering from a cold or from illness of any sort. Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock he walked down town to the law office of Miller & Lamb, where he remained for an hour and a half. He returned from his walk without even feeling fatigued, and in the evening went to a neighbor's to make a short call. He retired early.

Thursday morning he awakened with a pain in his chest, which at first was hardly noticeable, but later grew worse until Mrs. Harrison became alarmed, and the family physician, Dr. Henry Jamison, was summoned. He pronounced it simply a cold, and at the time feared no alarming results.

Then the lungs became rapidly affected, and Sunday the physicians became alarmed.
