PLAGIARISM CHARGED.

Minchin, Winner of Oratorical Contest, Accused of Stealing His Oration.

Word has been received in Eugene that McMinnville college has filed with the executive committee of the intercollegiate oratorical association a charge of plagiarism against Elwood Minchin, the freshman from Pacific college at Newberg, who won the medal at the intercollegiate oratorical contest at Corvallis last Friday evening.

It is alleged that Minchin, the subject of whose oration was "Wendell Phillips, the Agitator," stole almost his entire address from a book, and with a little retouching here and there, had the audacity and nerve to stand before an audience of intelligent people and deliver it, claiming it as original. The executive committee will immediately investigate the matter and interesting developments are looked for.

Minchin is only 17 years old, and it was thought by many at the time the oration was delivered that some of the thoughts and ideas contained in it were pretty far advanced for one so young.

THAT NEW TAX LAW.—About the only change in the assessment law enacted by the last legislature, so far as the work of the present assessor is concerned, is the provision for the assessment of farm machinery owned by foreign residents, in the name of the person holding the machinery. The great change in the taxation law is that in reference to the payment of taxes. Hereafter payments are to be made semi-annually, on June 1 and December 1, to the sheriff. If paid before a certain date a rebate is to be allowed. During a certain period they are to be paid at their face, and then a penalty is to be added. And this twice a year. This will mean additional work in the sheriff's office.

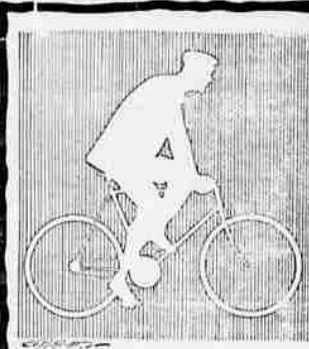
