His voice is high-keyed, nasal and grotesque, yet there is something in it which affords the reliability of his hearers to an unwanted degree. The man's appearance is in keeping with his music; he is himself wizened, leathery and grotesque, yet so bright and cheerful that he instills a hearty good humor instantly and no one grudges him the nickles and dimes which he collects for "the fiddler."

Hops—Salem Statesman: Hop growers are more generally making contracts than they have done for several years. This is due to several causes, chief among which is the fact that the prices offered are higher than for a long time. Another is the fact that hop dealers now in the business are generally more reliable than the average of those in the past. It is evident that the consumers in England and in the East, for whom most of the contracts are being made, have concluded that it is the safest plan for them to be sure of a supply at living prices, instead of waiting until after harvest, with the hope of beating the growers down to impoverishing prices.
