Berkeley Athletes to Meet U. O.
Men in Eugene May 7.

CONTEST AT BANGS' PARK.

Arrangements have been perfected whereby there will be a dual athletic contest between the teams of the State Universities of Oregon and California, at Bangs' Park, Tuesday, May 7.

For some time negotiations for the above meet have been pending, but not until today was the matter definitely decided upon. The University of California is scheduled to meet Stanford on the 20th inst, and the best men of the Berkeley team will be selected to come north and contest with the Universities of Oregon and Washington; the meet with the latter team will be held in Seattle Saturday, May 11.

Eugene will thus witness two of the most important athletic events of the coast, as the Oregon-Washington meet is scheduled for this city on May 18th. These field meets will be great drawing cards for our town, as visitors will attend from all over the valley. Although Bangs' Park is somewhat inconvenient on account of the distance from town, lines of buses will be run to and from the grounds and it is certain that a large crowd can be accommodated. The Southern Pacific Company will give excursion rates for both men and no efforts will be spared to make them successful.

The U O men are training hard and Mr Trine promises to have them in good form for both contests. From the splendid material on hand it is certain that a strong team will be selected.
