FAVORS BRICK.

Thinks the Directors Will Make a
Mistake if Wood Is Used.

EDITOR GUARD:—Since the school directors of this district have adopted a plan for the new school building to be erected this summer, the people, taxpayers and patrons of the schools in Eugene, ought to insist that the building be brick, and not wood. This building should be permanent, first-class, and designed to last a half century or more. At the meeting of the citizens held to consider the question whether the district should issue bonds for the erection of the building or buildings, it certainly was understood by a majority of the persons present at that meeting that the building should be brick. The difference in the cost of a brick or wood structure is but little comparatively, but the brick is so much more durable, easier to heat and keep warm during the winter weather, and so much cooler in the warm weather of the spring and summer, there is no comparison. This building is to be erected from borrowed money, which must be paid by people in the distant future, and they ought to have a building that is durable and first-class. Don't put up something that the people don't want, just because you can get it done for ten cents less. Let us have a brick building, a good one, and the people will commend you.

NEXT STATE FAIR.—Preparations are being made to make the next state fair a grand success. The exhibits promised are to be more and better than in the past. Improvements are to be made on the grounds amounting to nearly \$8000, including \$3700 on the pavilion. A large list of entries have been made for the races. Among them A. W. Ream, of Eugene, has entered his b. m. Al Me by Memo Altamont in the \$1000 purse for 215 paces; also L. Rickel, of Eugene, has entered his b. m. Zina by Jerome Bedouin in the \$500 purse for 3 and 4-year-old pacers; also A. W. Ream has entered his b. m. Lermont by Del Norte, dam by Pilot Lamont in the \$1000 purse for two-year-olds.

SOLDIERS' FOUNTAIN.

Will Be Located in Southwest Corner of Court House Lot.

Mayor G. R. Chrisman this afternoon held a conference with County Judge H. R. Kincaid and County Commissioner H. D. Edwards in regard to the location of the memorial fountain to be erected by the Women's Republican Patriotic League, in memory of the volunteers from Lane county, who gave their lives to their country in the recent war with Spain and in the Filipino insurrection.

It was decided to place the fountain at the southwest corner of the court house lot next to the sidewalk, and it is intended for a drinking place for man only.

The fountain is expected to arrive in about ten days and it will be erected immediately after its arrival. Appropriate ceremonies will be had at its dedication.

GLENDAL SMALLPOX.

The Quarantine Raised From the Town.

Roseburg Review, April 11.

The smallpox conditions at Glendale have been improving steadily for several days past, and upon the urgent request of leading citizens there and the advice of Dr. Downing, who has been in charge as health officer, Judge Thompson and District Attorney Brown decided today to raise the quarantine on the business portion of the town.

The city officials of Glendale agree to co-operate with the county authorities in maintaining a strict guard over the three houses where the disease still exists there, and will promptly isolate and guard any new case which might possibly yet develop. Trains will now stop at Glendale as usual.

A BOOKING TOWN.—Brownsville Times: Plans for the new hotel building at Blue River City have been drafted. The building will be 60x40 feet on the ground and two stories high. It will be constructed on foundations and will contain about 35 rooms. A general merchandise store has also been opened up there by Glen O. Powers, and another will be put in by C. S. Sparks, owner of the townsite.
