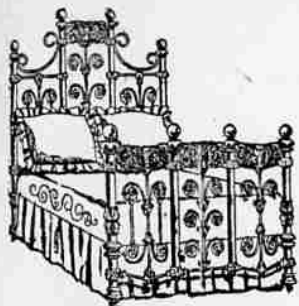

EUGENE VS MULTNOMAH.

Telegram Thinks Chances in Favor of the Club.

MEET TO BE HELD MAY 25.

Multnomah men are now interested considerably in the coming meet with the University of Oregon track team, which will be held in Portland May 25, says the Portland Telegram. Since the California Oregon field day, and the fast time made by a number of the Oregonians, grave doubts have been expressed in certain circles as to the ability of the club men to pull out a victory.

Second sober thought, however, and a thorough understanding of the situation, places a different light on matters, and tends to give strength to the assertion that the Multnomah club will win. In the first place, it should be stated that the time made was undoubtedly fast, that is, the watches were fast. Timers admit that there is nothing more difficult than to keep exact time, and it is likely to be a trifle fast or too slow. The timers did their best, undoubtedly, so California secured as good time, if not better, than Oregon; but still there is a feeling on the part of many that the time was not wholly accurate.

In the 100-yard dash, for instance, Cadogan was credited with 10 fls. That he can make this time is true, but hardly probable in view of the fact that he had barely stepped from a ride from San Francisco. Coach Christie, who knows his man, said that Cadogan was not in condition to run the 100 yards in 10 fls. The same with the other events, where especially fast time was made.

E. W. May, who acted as referee to the satisfaction of all interested parties, says he knows from experience how hard it is to time a man, and that without a great deal of experience, not a year, but years, a mistake is liable to happen. So certain was he that the watches were fast, Graduate Manager Reno Hutchinson stated that no attempt would be made to claim any records but the hammer throw which Plaw made, something over 163 feet. Heater will be the chief opponent Multnomah will have in the 100-yard dash, but Gamble ought to be able to take first place from him. In 220, Gamble will again appear, and it is reasonable to suppose he will improve, should have no trouble in bettering his record of 23 fls.

The quarter and half will undoubtedly go to Orell. He is showing an improvement at the hands of Trainer King, who predicts that his man will go the half mile in close to two minutes. With Blumethal entered in the 440, first and second places are as good as won for the Portland contingent.

Heater, with his 22 feet in the broad jump, has made first place a little uncertain, but Kerrigan will make a good man for the "Winged M." The weights may be figured as gaining the most points for Multnomah also.

The above from the Portland Telegram is of course the Portland view of the matter, but we predict the Telegram will have at entirely different story to tell after May 25.

THE WENDLING MILL.—Few people who have not visited the Booth-Kelly Co's big sawmill at Wendling are aware of the immense output of lumber from that mill. The GUARD is informed that at present from 12 to 20 carloads of lumber are hauled out from Wendling daily and that on or about June 1st the mill will be running day and night when it is expected that from 25 to 30 carloads will be taken out every day.
