DEDICATION OF FOUNTAIN.

Will Occur Friday Afternoon,
May 17.

The Women's Republican Patriotic League has finally set the time for the dedication and unveiling of the memorial fountain in memory of the Lane county volunteers who gave up their lives in defense of their country's flag.

The Eugene military companies have been invited by the ladies to participate in the exercises and it is highly probable that they will accept the invitation. The Fourth Regiment band will furnish music for the occasion.

The time set is Friday afternoon, May 17. The league has sent out the following address:

TO THE CITIZENS OF LANE COUNTY:

The unveiling and dedication of the Memorial Fountain will take place Friday, May 17, 1901, at 2:30 p m, to which ceremonies you are cordially invited. This fountain has been obtained by the ladies of the Women's Patriotic League at an expense of nearly \$700, and will be dedicated on the above date to the memory of Lane county's sons who lost their lives in the Philippines. It is hoped and expected by the league that there will be a general turnout from all over the county. Col O Summers and Chaplain W S Gilbert, who were colonel and chaplain respectively of the Second Oregon, will be present and assist prominently in the ceremonies. Press Comment on Death of Prof.
McElroy.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dispatch, May 5.

Prof E B McElroy, of Eugene, Oregon, died yesterday morning at that place. He was a native of West Middleton, Pennsylvania. He had been prominently identified with the educational interests of Oregon for a quarter of a century, having served twelve years as state superintendent of public instruction. During the Civil War he served in a West Virginia regiment, and later in the One Hundredth Pennsylvania (Roundhead) regiment.

His wife, who survives, was Miss Agnes McFadden, a granddaughter of the late Alexander Campbell, the great Disciple preacher and founder of Bethany, (W Va) college. Prof McElroy was prominent in republican politics in Oregon. He leaves many relatives in Western Pennsylvania.

A CURIOSITY.

Swarm of Bees Have Made Their
Home in a Flue.

At Dr G Biddle's residence on Olive street between Fifth and Sixth a large swarm of bees have taken up their abode in an old unused flue.

The bees, which from indications, have no doubt been there for several years, were first discovered last Friday. The flue, which has not been used for eleven years, runs up through the roof from Dr Biddle's laboratory. Friday the doctor noticed quite a number of the little honey-makers flying around the room and alighting on the windows, and on looking about to see where they came from saw a number coming through a crack in the wall paper which covers the stove-pipe hole in the flue. Upon further investigation he was astonished to find the flue, which is six or eight feet high, literally full of the buzzing insects.

Dr Biddle had a bee expert examine the nest and he is of the opinion that the bees have been there for a number of years. Dr and Mrs Biddle have noticed that there always has been a large number of bees in their back yard but have thought they were attracted by the fruit blossoms and flowers and never once thought of finding a whole swarm in the chimney.

Dr Biddle has widened the crack in the wall paper and has placed a small box with artificial honey comb there, and if he is successful in getting the bees to work in the box he will place a large patent bee-hive on the roof and connect it with the flue, and try and induce the little fellows to move their home factory to a more convenient place.
