CITY COUNCIL.

Adjourned Session Held Last Night.

City Council met in adjourned session last evening, present Mayor Chrisman, Councilman Osburn, Roney, Peter and Barker.

Councilman Roney reported street work progressing satisfactorily. In the matter of petition for sewer on Eleventh or Twelfth street to connect with sewer in the alley between Pearl and High streets after discussion Mr Roney moved that the sewer be located sixteen feet from the south line of Eleventh street thence east to A street, thence south to Thirteenth street if practicable. Motion carried.

On petition of property owners for a sewer from Charnelton to Madison street. Mr Roney reported that water mains extend to Washington street only and moved that prayer of petitioners be granted and the sewer be constructed in the alley between Sixth and Seventh streets from Charnelton to Washington street. Motion carried.

On motion of Councilman Roney a ten foot sidewalk was ordered constructed on the north side of Seventh street from Olive, east to the alley.

J H McClung who was present asked permission of the council to put building material on Seventh and Willamette streets during construction of his building which was granted.

Petition of Wm Ruth et al for an arc light to be hung at the intersection of First and Madison streets was read and referred to judiciary committee.

An invitation from the G A R for council to participate in the memorial exercises on May 30th was read and invitation accepted.

Petition of C Waddie asking that Manhattan saloon license be transferred to John J Rude, ordered granted when requisite bonds are filed.

There being no further business council adjourned to meet in special session Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

OREGON WINS.

A Splendid Victory for U. O. Yesterday.

SCORE 66-12 TO 55-1-2.

The big field meet between the state universities of Oregon and Washington resulted in a victory for the Oregon team with a score of 66 to 55-1-2.

Oregon is jubilant and has reason to be. She defeated Washington at football last winter, won the debate from Washington Friday evening and now wins the athletic field meet with a margin of 11 points!

The events yesterday were pulled off satisfactorily, and although the crowd in attendance was not large, what it lacked in numbers it made up in noise. It was an enthusiastic crowd. After each event whether the winner was from Oregon or Washington, a lusty cheer went up from the crowd.

NOTES.

As usual Heater was the star performer. He made a score of 23 points for his team.

Young Pearson made the most points for his team, 15. He is a wonderful youth. In the 220-yard and 440-yard dashes he won first place with ease.

Caulkins, from whom so much was expected, only made 12 points. Heater beat him out by several yards in both hurdle races.

Neither did Field, Washington's discus man, do so well as expected. Wagner won the event by several feet.

Washington had it all her own way in the relay race. Oregon conceded that event to her from the outset.

There was considerable dispute over the decision in the 220-yard dash. Payne, (Ore) and Chestnut, (Wash) were very close at the outcome, and Payne's friends declared he was winner of the second place, but the judges decided otherwise.

Smith did well in the hammer throw. His furthest throw was 127 feet, 9 inches which beats the state record held by him.

Washington counted on winning the mile run, but Freshman Poley came out ahead by 40 or 50 feet.

The 1/2 point on each side is accounted for by Knox and Lindig tying for third place in the pole vault.

President Strong was given three cheers as he arrived on the field to witness the events.

The track team is "in the hole" some \$125 as a result of the bad weather.

Knox and Tout tied for second place in the high jump. Caulkins was the event. He is a pretty jumper. Knox had not fully recovered from a sprain received in a tryout several weeks ago, or the event might have resulted differently.

Tout is coming to the front as a high jumper and pole vaulter.

Wagner was in splendid condition. His performances with the weights yesterday exceeded the expectations of his admirers.

In the broad jump Saturday Caulkins jumped only 1/2 of an inch less than Heater.

Capt Redmond was in better shape yesterday than he was in the meet with California. He made a splendid showing in the 44-yard dash.

A MORNING FIRE.

Residence of Mrs Harding Narrowly Escaped Being Burned.

This morning at 7:30 o'clock the alarm of fire was sounded and the firemen quickly responded. The blaze was located at the residence of Mrs B F Harding on Charnelton street between Eighth and Ninth.

The interior of the house was damaged to the extent of about \$100 by the fire and the furniture and carpets perhaps \$100 by water and mud tramped in by those who put out the blaze. The house and contents were fully insured in the Sun and Home Mutual Companies, F W Osburn and Geo F Crow, agents, respectively.

Mrs Harding who left on the 3 o'clock train for Salem, had a small fire in the sitting room stove just before leaving, and the wood work evidently caught fire from the flue.

Dr McAister, in passing the house, first discovered smoke issuing out of the roof of the building and immediately gave the alarm. The front door was broken into and a stream from the chemical engine soon extinguished the flames.

DIED.—Dudley, the 7-year-old son of Mr and Mrs A Boddy, died at the family home at the east end of Eighth street this morning at 6:45 o'clock, from an abscess. The funeral was held this afternoon at 4 o'clock and the remains were buried in the I O O F cemetery.
