This arrangement will delay mail
for Jasper, Hazel Dell and the Fall
Creek country 24 hours on every day
except Saturday when it will be de-
layed 48 hours. There is much dis-
satisfaction over the proposed change
and petitions are out for resumption of
the star route. It is said the govern-
ment saves only 35 cents a trip through
the change. The original program
was to end the railroad agent's route at
Springfield.
