THE HIGH SCHOOL.

First Graduating Exercises Held
Last Night.

ALUMNI FORMED.

The first commencement exercises of the Eugene High School held at the Christian church last night were largely attended, every seat in the auditorium, gallery and lecture room being occupied, and quite a number being compelled to stand.

The exercises began at 8 o'clock. On the rostrum were seated Superintendent E. D. Rossier, Rev. W. S. Gilbert, who delivered the address to the class, Directors Schwarzschild, Eakin and McClung and the members of the graduating class as follows: Herbert Claire Eastland, Lola Howe, Mae DeCamp Kinsey, Clayborne Rhodes, Nellie Mae Smith, Frank Ellsworth Taylor, A. Orville Waller, Chester Wesley Washburne, Cora Tashalla Riggs Wold.

On the platform were piled many beautiful bouquets of choice roses and other flowers, so abundant in Eugene at this time of year, presented to the class, and overhead there was a pretty network of ribbons of the class colors.

The program commenced with a selection by the High School Mandolin Club consisting of Messrs Kerns, Bellman and Gross, which was followed by a fervent prayer by Dr. D. E. Lovelidge, rector of the Episcopal church. Next came a well-executed piano duet by Misses Camille Carroll and Eddie Ford, followed by Frank Taylor's oration on the subject "Japan, a New World Power." Miss Mae Kinsey was next with her oration, "Pavia and Santiago," then the High School Glee Club sang "The New Hail Columbia." The club consists of Misses Daisy Gilbert, Cora Wold, Camille Carroll, Lillian McElroy, soprano; Misses Norma Hendricks, Nellie Smith, Reba Craig, alto; Messrs Edgar Martin, Claude Adams, Chas. Austin, tenors; Messrs Chester Washburne, Edward Lister, Arthur McAllister, basses. Following the Glee Club's selection the class history was read by Miss Lola Howe and was quite interesting. The subject of Miss Cora Wold's oration was "Regulus," and it was very well delivered. The Mandolin Club then favored the audience with another selection, and Prof. Rossier after a few appropriate remarks announced Rev. W. S. Gilbert, of Portland, who spoke for thirty minutes in his usual interesting manner, the address being full of excellent thought and good advice to the class. Rev. Gilbert having been one of the school directors of this district at the time of the organization of the Eugene High School, four years ago, it was eminently appropriate that he should deliver the address to this, the school's first graduating class. After the address the Glee Club sang another selection which was followed by the presentation of the diploma by Director Eakin. Professor Rossier then made a few remarks touching his work as superintendent of the Eugene High School during the past four years and expressing his regrets on the severance of his connection with them. The audience was dismissed after singing "America."

HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI.

After the exercises at the church the members of the graduating class proceeded to the Barquet cafe where they enjoyed a banquet given by Professor Rossier and where a High School alumni association was organized. Following were the officers elected: Miss Cora Wold, president; Orville Waller, vice-president; Miss Mae Kinsey, secretary; Chester Washburne, treasurer.
