**TRANSVAAL MINES RESPONSIBLE**

**British Government Will Make Kaffir Stocks Pay Half Expenses of Boer War**

**WILL COST STOCKHOLDERS \$250,000,000**

NEW YORK, June 13.—A London dispatch this morning says the British government has decided that the Transvaal gold mines must pay half the cost of the Boer war.

The levy on the stockholders will reach the enormous sum of \$250,000,000. The determination of the government to make the miners pay part of the cost of the war causes the greatest consternation among the holders of Kaffir stocks.

**GOING TO WORK.**

**The Southern Pacific Co. Will Improve Lines in Oregon.**

**SPLENDID NEWS.**

PORTLAND, Or, June 13.—The S P R Co will make extensive improvements on their Oregon lines this summer. As soon as practicable the steam shovel will be moved to the river pit at Harrisburg and will re-ballast their entire main line, placing about 15 inches of gravel upon the roadbed. This will place the roadbed up to the standard of Eastern roads.

On the Mohawk line ballasting will commence about July 1st. Roadmaster Walte is now on that branch making preliminary arrangements for this work and it is said he has found a good bed of gravel easily accessible to the road. It is reported that President Hays will put all of the Southern Pacific lines in first-class order.

**BASEBALL SUNDAY.**

**Ramblers and Bohemias Will Play Again at the Park.**

Arrangements have been completed for another game of baseball between the Ramblers of this city and the Bohemias of Cottage Grove, to be played at Bangs' Park next Sunday.

The Ramblers have defeated the Bohemias twice this season, but the latter team has been built up considerably since the last game and expect to make a much better showing Sunday.

**ALBANY VS EUGENE.**

The game between the local team and the Albany Ramblers to be played at the Park Sunday, June 23rd, is an assured fact, final arrangements having been consummated today. The management of the Albany team announces that a special train will be run to Eugene on that day and a large number of rooters will accompany the team.

**OPERA HOUSE FIXTURES SOLD.**

Attorney Lee M. Travis, agent for Mrs. L. C. Parker, has sold to Walter Ross the chairs and other fixtures in the old Parker opera house.

**Indications of Oil.**

Pendleton, Or, June 13.—F. G. McIntosh and an East Oregonian representative visited the Sanford Stroud place, 11 miles south from Pendleton on McKay creek, yesterday afternoon, and inspected the oil exploration works of P. L. Kretzer & Son. The Kretzers are now down 160 feet and are in a black rock. Water taken from the shaft shows drops of oil that are thought to indicate the presence of petroleum. The elder Kretzer stated that he is confident that oil will be found, and his work will be prosecuted until a complete demonstration has been made one way or the other.

**GRANTED A SCHOLARSHIP.**

Mark Woolf, of Newberg, has been granted a scholarship in history at the University of Oregon next year. Mr. Woolf is a graduate of Pacific college this year. A number of other scholarships are still open to graduates of the University of Oregon and other colleges of the state.

**CAMP CREEK OIL**

**Ed Duryee Will Soon Develop His Prospects.**

**VERY GOOD INDICATIONS.**

Ed M. Duryee, upon whose farm in the Camp Creek country, twelve miles northeast of Eugene there are strong indications of the existence of petroleum and mention of which has been made in recent issues of the GUARD, today informed a reporter that the prospects will be developed soon.

F. A. McBride, from the Southern California oil fields, has been in Eugene and vicinity for a few days and has examined the prospects on Mr. Duryee's place and pronounces them to be very good. He left this afternoon for Los Angeles and will immediately send representatives of a company there to Eugene to further investigate the matter and if they arrive at the same conclusion that Mr. McBride has, viz., that the prospects warrant the expenditure of money for their development, they will commence boring as soon as the necessary apparatus is secured. This company has heard of the Camp Creek prospects and is anxious to send its representatives here to develop them.

The Los Angeles company is already established and doing business in California, and will not wait to sell stock before they begin operations.

Mr. McBride, who has considerable knowledge of the oil business, says that the geological formation of the Camp Creek country is exactly like that around Petaluma and at other California oil districts, and that it is his opinion that petroleum exists there in great quantities.
