Southern Oregon Company Receives Machinery From East.

Ashland, Oregon, June 20.—The oil boring machinery for the Southern Oregon Oil Company, of Ashland, which has been delayed in shipment from Chicago to this place, reached here this evening.

A large amount of steel casing has been on hand for some time and work has been going on for several days in constructing the derrick, which has reached a height of 50 feet.
