Position of Manager of Lines in Oregon Dispensed With.

HAYS' CIRCULAR.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—The Chronicle says: The latest story concerning changes involved in the reorganization of the operating department of the Southern Pacific is that the position of manager of the lines in Oregon will be abolished when President Hays' circular makes its appearance. Richard Koehler is manager of Southern Pacific lines in Oregon. Nothing is said as to what is to become of Koehler, but the statement that his position is to be abolished leaves it to be inferred that he will retire from the company's service. Coupled with the story that Koehler's position is to be abolished is the statement that the position of general superintendent is to be revived and that J. H. Herbert may be honored with this title.
