FROM ALASKA

Victor L. Holt Tells of Business
Conditions, Etc.

TOTEM POLES

Victor L. Holt, a graduate of the
University of Oregon last year, and
who has recently returned from Fort
Wrangle, Alaska, where he has been
teaching in the government school,
was interviewed today by a reporter.
When asked how he found the busi-
ness outlook in Southern Alaska, he
said:
"Men and corporations with money
are doing well. Laboring men get
from \$40 to \$15 per month. There is
not enough capital to properly employ
the number of laboring and seasonal
men there. A little barn of a cannery
near Fort Wrangle cleared \$40,000 last
year. I am told that other canneries,
salties, sawmills, etc., have prospered
in proportion.""How do you find school teaching
in Alaska?" was asked.
"There are only 35 or 40 deservable
positions there, but scholars and teach-
ers for twice as many. The govern-
ment furnishes its teachers with every-
thing but food, clothing and scholars
and these are easily obtained. Our
form of government is despotic; we
haven't even a delegate to look after
our interests; but a new country may
have its faults as to government and
yet be a good place to live.""Are the natives of Southern Alaska
very superstitious?""No. The hundreds of totems found
there are family histories. Boston
man's history is written; the native's
history is carved. The totems werenever worshiped. There are two kinds
of totem poles: The large family totems,
in which the ashes of the cremated
tyees of the family are deposited, and
the small totems, which one may easily
carry around with him to remind
him of his ancestry, and his place in
his tribe. The former kind are seldom
less than 10 to 15 feet in height, and
are often carved from huge logs and
stand head and shoulders above the
buildings about them. In former
times vast quantities of food were
burned (turned to spirit) that the
spirit of the man might live in the
spirit of the food. Slaves were then
burned that their spirit might accom-
pany and wait upon the spirit of the
tyee. But now almost all the natives
give their dead a Christian burial."The famous Eagle totem was
erected by the members of the Eagle
family. The image at the top of the
pole represents the eagle which carried
salmon to their tribe in time of famine.
Just below the eagle is the friendly
tyee who received the salmon. And
below the tyee can be seen a string of
salmon."
