PROF. A. F. BECHDOLT BLUE RIVER MINES.

Selected as Superintendent of Eugene Public Schools.

The Great Northern Bonded for \$30,000 to Wisconsin Men.

VERY HIGHLY RECOMMENDED.

A dispatch received last evening from School Director S. B. Eakin, who is now in Seattle, brought the information that Prof. A. F. Bechdolt, of that city, has been chosen as superintendent of the Eugene public schools to succeed Prof. E. D. Rosier, resigned, and who has been appointed a member of the faculty of the University of Oregon.

Among the forty or more applications for the position from all parts of the country, the school board picked out Prof. Bechdolt as most fitted to fill the place and authorized Mr. Eakin to engage him if, upon personally interviewing him, in his opinion, he was what his recommendations represented him to be. The board will hold a meeting soon to ratify the action of Director Eakin.

Prof. Bechdolt is 54 years of age and is a Ph. D. He has a very good appearance and is splendidly recommended. He has held a position in the Seattle public schools for some time and came to that city from Minnesota where he was successfully engaged for many years in educational work. He will arrive in Eugene some time next month and take up his work at the beginning of the school year.

Charles Griffin Was Easily the Star Performer.

HE MADE 41 POINTS.

OIL OPERATIONS.

Southern Oregon Oil Co. Boring at Ashland.

The Ashland Tidings has the following about the operations of the Southern Oregon Oil Co., in which several Eugene people hold stock:

Operations at the site of the Southern Oregon Oil Co.'s new oil boring plant have been steadily pushed along during the past week, and some minor troubles incident to the starting of new machinery have been experienced. The drill pounded along in blue clay until about 40 feet down when a formation was reached which is thought to be an old river bed. It was a gravel drift which closed over the opening made by the drill as it went down. It was found necessary to ease through this quicksand, which has been done and good progress is now confidently expected. Water has been encountered and colors of gold are frequent. Just as soon as things are in steady working order, Manager Whitney intends to put on a night shift and push the work as fast as possible. Expert J. B. Treadwell, who accompanied Messrs. Guggenheim and Mack on their visit here, gave it as his opinion that oil would be struck at a depth of 1500 feet.
