HIGHER RATES.-Beginning Sunday, July 21, the rate on the S. P. R. All intermediate points will be raised. The rate now in force is first-class \$12, second-class \$9.50. The advance is to \$12.25 and \$14 respectively. The rates on steamers will also be raised.
